Robert Laughlin of Glenelg Drowns in Owen Sound Bay

Was Employed on Scow District Deputy Grand Which Sank After Accident

Robert Laughlin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Laughlin of Glenelg. lost his life about 1.30 o'clock on Saturday last in the waters of the Owen Sound Bay, when a sunken dead head, with one end just below the surface and the other embedded in the mud at the bottom, crushed its way through the side of a loaded scow, sending it to the bottom of the

Laughlin, who was 22 years age, had been in the employ of the Randolph McDonald Dredging Co. since May 7th, when work was begun on dredging out the old slip. He was riding on the scow, which was laden with silt from the bottom of the bay, and it was being towed by the tug Reginald out into the lake to be dumped when it ran on the sunken log.

When the dead head struck the scow, and crashed its way through, Laughlin, apparently becoming panic stricken, rushed to the opposite end and threw himself into the water. Whether he could swim or not is unknown, but he had no chance, hampered as he was by the rubber boots and clumsy overalls. He sank from sight almost immediately, and never re-appeared.

The nearest telephone was almost a quarter of a mile away, and soon as it could be reached, the fire brigade were called. They were quickly on the scene with a boat and dragging operations were begun. About five minutes dragging brought the body to the surface and it was taken ashore. It had, however, been in the water for over half an hour, life was completely extinct.

This was the first time that the young man had ever done work of this kind. He had been engaged in farming until about three weeks ago when he accepted this position with the Randelph McDonald Co. He was the eldest of a family of seven, and is survived by three brothers and three sisters: Chester, Kenneth and Stanley, Ruby, Zella and Elsie Mae, all at home.

During the short time Laughlin had been with the dredging company, he had come to be regarded as an excellent workman, and held the highest respect of those with whom he was working. The sudden tragedy has struck hard and activity has been completely paralyzed.

The funeral took place on Tuesday from his late home in Glenelg to the Anglican Church cemetery near Durham.
