LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

The market was closed on Monday and on Tuesday 4000 cattle arrived, which met with a ready sale at very satisfactory prices. Choice handy weight butcher cattle were in strong demand.

Best heavy steers brought from \$8.00 to \$8.50; fair to good from 7.25 to \$8.00. Top butcher steers and heifers ranged from 7.25 to 7.75; fair to good from 6.50 to 7.00; common to medium 5.75 to 6.25. Choice baby beefs sold at from \$8.00 to \$8.50; medium to good from 7.00 to \$8.00. Stockers and feeders were in strong demand. Choice cows brought from 5.75 to 6.00; fair to good from 5.00 to 5.75; common to medium 3.75 to 4.50; canners and cutters 2.75 to 3.50. Choice heavy bulls from 4.25 to 4.50; bolognas 3.75 to 4.25.

Supplies of lambs were very light and choice spring lambs sold at from \$8.00 to 10.00 each, but unfinished and medium quality lambs were not wanted. Best light sheep sold at from 4.00 to 4.50; heavy at 3.50. The calves opened slow, with top sales being made at \$8.50; fair to good from 7.50 to \$8.25; common to medium from 5.00 to 6.50.

Following last week's sharp advance in hog prices, the market held active and strong on Tuesday in spite of lower bids from buyers. Truck deliveries sold on the basis of from 9.00 to 9.25 and car load hogs from 8.50 to 8.65 f.o.b.
