Keffer, on crushing contract, \$100.00; Anglo Canadian Underwriters, Ltd., Toronto, premium on Liability Insurance on Township Roads with "Lloyds" from May 5, 1937, to May 5, 1938, \$161.55; Isaac Hooper, lumber to repair fence at Township Hall, \$12.32; Durham Agricultural Society, grant to Fall Fair, \$5.00; Priceville Agricultural Society, grant to Fall Fair, \$5.00; Clerk, for completing one application for Old Age Pension, \$2.00; Geo. Whitmore, balance salary as Collector \$65.00, postage and stationery \$7.23.

Robinson - D'Arcy—That County Treasurer be paid the sum of \$158.25, being 50 per cent. (Glenelg's share) re maintenance of Mrs. Cargo in Weston Hospital, said amount being for period ending March 31, 1937.—Carried.

Crutchley - D'Arcy—That relief accounts incurred previous to May 1st, 1937, be paid as follows: L. Chapman, for groceries, \$2.95; McGowan Bros., flour, \$3.90; H. G. Nesbitt \$6.87; James Watson, milk, \$2.80.—Carried.

Robinson - D'Arcy—That Payment Voucher No. 6 be passed and payments made accordingly for work on roads, amount \$737.42.—Cd.

D'Arcy - Robinson—That we accept the sum of \$6.07 for scrap of old grader from H. Irwin, Markdale.—Carried.

The printing contract for the current year was awarded to The MacDonald Duplicating Service, Durham.

A deputation of ratepayers from the 4th and 6th Concessions waited on the Council re the opening of a road between Lots 5 and 6, connecting the 4th and 6th Concessions. In this connection it was moved by J. F. Crutchley, seconded by F. A. D'Arcy, That this Council, after going over the proposed road at Lots 5 and 6, Cons. 5 and 6, deem it unwise to take any action at the present time.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to Saturday, July 4th, at 10 a.m. for general business.
