LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

DUNN & LEVACK, TORONTO

In spite of the heavy supplies of cattle which arrived for Monday's market, the trade was active and steady. Export buyers for shipments to both the United Kingdom and the United States were again prominent operators, which was of much assistance to the market as a whole.

Choice heavy steers were in good demand at from \$.25 to \$.75; fair to good from 7.75 to 8.25; medium from 7.00 to 7.50. In the butcher section, choice handy weight steers and heifers sold readily at from 7.75 to S.00; fair to good from 7.00 to 7.65; common to medium from 6.00 to 7.00. Choice baby beeves brought from \$.50 to 9.00; medium to good from 7.00 to \$.25. Stockers and feeders were in good demand, selected light cattle selling from 5.00 to 5.50 and feeders from 6.00 to 6.50. The cow trade held steady, choice fat cows from 5.50 to 5.75 and choice heifery cows from 6.00 to 5.25; fair to good butcher cows from 4.50 to 5.25; common to medium 3.25 to 4.00; canners and cutters 2.50 to 3.00. Milch cows and springers were slow of sale. Choice heavy bulls sold at from 4.50 to 5.00 and bolognas from 4.00 to 4.25.

In the small meats, choice spring lambs sold at from 12.75 to 13.00 on Monday. The indications are that prices will work lower as the supplies increase. The sheep trade was slow. The calf market held steady with the close of the week previous, which was lower, choice calves selling at 7.50, with an occasional calf of fancy quality at 8.00; fair to good calves from 6.00 to 7.00; common to medium 5.00 to 6.00.

The hog market was at a standstill on account of lower bids from the buyers. No price settlement was made on Monday, but it was felt sales would be completed at 8.75 and better.
