Hepburn Asks Motorists To "Try Courtesy" When Tourists Visit Ontario

Nearly 10 Million Will Come From U. S. This Season, Estimates Indicate

NOW SECOND INDUSTRY

With the approaching celebrations of Dominion Day, July 1, and Independence Day, July 4, Ontario's Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn yesterday declared the holiday and tourist season in Ontario officially open and in full swing.
Tourist bureau estimates, he stated, indicate that between May and September of this year nearly Ten million people will cross the International Boundary from United States into Ontario in more than 3,000,000 automobiles, and during their stay here will spend about \$150,000,000. Over 500,000 of these visitors will travel to Callander, near North Bay, to view the pranks and home-life of the world-famous Dionne quintuplets.
"The tourist business," Mr. Hepburn said, "now ranks second among the three leading industries of the province. Agriculture still ranks first, though our great mining industry in Northern Ontario has moved to third place to make way for the business of entertaining our United States cousins."
He pointed to the responsibility which every Ontario citizen must assume in connection with the summer tourist season.
"Each of us," he emphasized, "must take on the duties of 'official host' and be sure our touring friends have as pleasant a time during their

stay in Ontario as we would want them to have if they came to visit our own private homes or summer cottages."

Since the vast majority of visitors will be travelling by automobile, explained Mr. Hepburn, a greater responsibility rests on Ontario's motorists to see that visiting drivers are accorded every highway courtesy.

He urged every driver to remember the "campaign slogan" of Highways Minister Hon. T. B. McQueen, who, in a concerted effort to reduce and check traffic accidents and fatalities, is endeavoring to have each one of Ontario's 800,000 motor vehicle operators "Try Courtesy" behind the wheel.

"No better opportunity is offered," Mr. Hepburn declared, "to promote international amity than for all of us in Ontario to 'Try Courtesy' on our American friends when they come to visit us this summer."

Last year, he said, the Ontario government travel bureau had handled 50,000 inquiries for holiday information and had distributed, chiefly in the United States, more than 600,000 official Ontario road maps and booklets picturing the natural beauties of Ontario as a vacation land. Another 600,000 pamphlets and folders describing camps and summer hotels of the province had also been distributed. There was every indication, Mr. Hepburn stated, that the 1937 tourist season in Ontario would show a general increase in visitors, cars and spending of at least 20 per cent.

Twenty-nine pupils, drawn from Markdale and the townships of Artemesia, Euphrasia, Holland and Glenelg, wrote their entrance examinations in Markdale.
