The Late Mrs. Solomon Turner  
The death occurred very suddenly on Thursday evening, June 17th,

of Mrs. Solomon Turner, a well-known and highly esteemed as well as one of the oldest residents of the village. She was seized by an attack of pneumonia on Wednesday evening and although doctor, nurse and loved ones had done all they could to restore her to health she peacefully passed away to the beautiful land beyond the following evening. The deceased, who was in her 88th year, was able as usual to do her daily routine of household work until taken ill. She was a woman of fine Christian character, a fond and unselfish mother, a kind neighbour and beloved by those who knew her. She was a member of the former Methodist Church and of late years the United Church. She attended the services regularly until the past few months.

The late Mrs. Turner, whose maiden name was Miss Martha Jane Crew, was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Crew. She was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, and was the last survivor of a family of eight. While quite a small child she moved with her parents to Scarboro where she spent her girlhood days. While there she married Mr. Solomon Turner and two years later the happy couple came to Artemesia township and resided on the 10th line, where they, as pioneers, made a home for themselves, and reared a family of three sons and five daughters. Eighteen years ago last fall they retired from the farm to the village here, and the following spring Mr. Turner passed away. Those left to mourn the death of a loving mother are: Mary, Mrs. Beecroft, 11th line, Artemesia; Isaac in Winnipeg; Oliver on the old homestead, 10th line; Rebecca, Mrs. W. Carruthers in Toronto; Isabel, Mrs. McGruther at Mont Clair, New Jersey; Eva, Mrs. McKenzie at Richmond Hill, and Ada, Mrs. Thomas Genoe of Ceylon. One son, Ed., passed away thirty-two years ago this June 17th, the day of the death of his mother. All were present at the funeral but one son, Isaac.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, conducted by Bennett & Richards of Flesherton. Rev. A. Bushell, her pastor, officiated at the house, Church and grave. After a short service at the house the remains were taken to the United Church where a large assemblage of friends and neighbours had gathered to pay their last respects to the deceased. Two Scripture passages, Psalm 96 and that beautiful extract from the Book of John, "In My Father's house are many mansions" etc., were read by the minister. Two hymns, "Lead Kindly Light" and "Abide with me", were sung. The choir rendered a beautiful selection, "Face to Face". Rev. Albert Bushell chose as his text "Going unto the Father", from which he delivered a very comforting message, assuring all that the soul of the deceased had passed from a land of turmoil into one of peace and glory and those who knew her best could feel assured that she is "Forever with the Lord". At the close of the service all filed by the lovely oaken casket to view the remains while the organist played a funeral dirge.

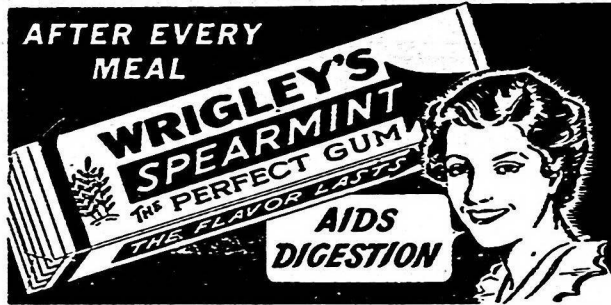

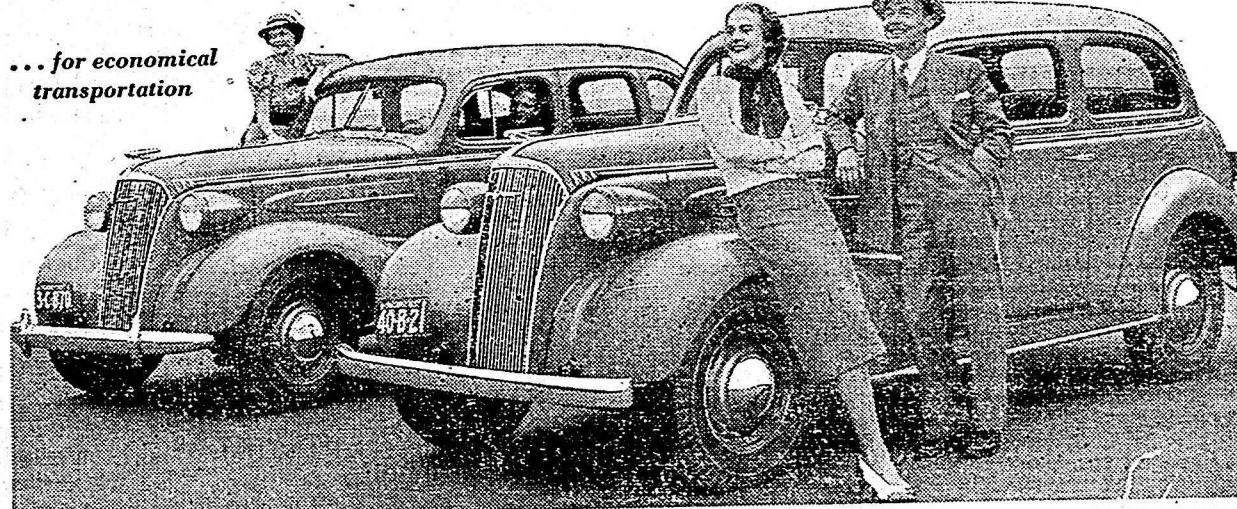
