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HOLLAND TOWNSHIP COUNCIL MINUTES

Holland, July 6th, 1937.
Council met on above date for the transaction of Township business, all the members present. John Heighes, Esq., Reeve presiding. Minutes of June meeting were read and confirmed.
The following were then read: Several relief accounts, totalling \$78.34; a number of Hospital accounts for indigents; request from Russell Freeman, for grant to Markdale Agricultural Society; communication from C. P. R., requesting permission to remove all the cattle guards in the Township; communication from the Clerk, tendering his resignation; report of Wm. Erwin, valuing sheep of A. W. Zettler, valued at \$8.00.
Gillespie - McFadden—That this Council accept the sum of \$11.23 from the Tax Collector, being taxes on Lot 67, Con. 1, W.T. & S.R., and the Clerk notify the County Treasurer to erase said taxes from above property.—Carried.
McFadden - Hanna—That this Council take no action regarding request of C. P. R. for removal of cattle guards.—Carried.
Gillespie - McFadden—That this Council give a grant of \$25.00 to improve the curve on 60 Sideroad, East.—Carried.
Dixon - Hanna—That this Council accept \$6.50 from Jno. Heighes for sale of old grader.—Carried.
Hanna - McFadden—That the Road Superintendent's Pay Sheet No. 6, for \$3195.85, be passed and the Treasurer be instructed to issue cheques for the same.—Carried.
Gillespie - Dixon—That the Reeve get legal advice on the Robert Graham hospital bill and act accordingly.—Carried.
Gillespie - McFadden—That this Council accept with regret the unexpected resignation of Mr. James P. Hare, as Clerk of this Township, and ask Mr. Hare to remain as adviser to the new Clerk until the end of 1937.—Carried.
Dixon - Hanna—That C. W. Saunders be appointed Fenceviewer for the balance of 1937.—Carried.
Gillespie - Hanna—That this Council instruct the Clerk to inform the Ontario Hospital Board that we do not consider Mrs. Annie Caswell, wife of Samuel Caswell of Holland Township, an indigent patient as Mr. Caswell is a young man, well able to work, and should be able to pay his own bills, and that this Council is opposed to having his bill turned in on the Municipal Railway Tax.—Carried.
Dixon - McFadden—That this Council instruct the Clerk to advertise for applications for the position of Clerk for the Township of Holland, with Mr. James P. Hare acting as adviser until the end of 1937. Duties to commence after August 3rd, 1937. Applications to be sent to Jas. P. Hare.—Carried.
Mr. Hanna presented Report No. 7 of the Finance Committee, recommending payment of \$104.94.
Gillespie - McFadden—That Report No. 7 of Finance Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.
Council then adjourned until Tuesday, August 3rd, at one o'clock p.m.

Recipes for Standard's Cook Book

FRUIT CAKE
2 cups brown sugar
2 cup shortening
2 cups milk
2 cups raisins
2 cups currants
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon cloves
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon allspice
1 teaspoon salt
Stir this mixture together and cook for 3 minutes. Cool and add:
4 cups flour
2 small teaspoons soda
2 dessert spoons baking powder
1 1/2 cups nut meats.
Bake in two well greased loaf tins for 45 minutes in moderate oven. Will keep indefinitely.

FRUIT CAKE
1 lb. butter
2 lbs. currants
2 lbs. raisins
1/2 lb. lemon peel
1/2 lb. citron peel
2 lbs. or 7 cups flour
2 tablespoons molasses
2 nutmeg
2 teaspoons cinnamon
4 teaspoons soda
1 quart new milk
4 cups white sugar
3 eggs
Mix butter and flour with hands; add peel finely cut, then fruit and spices. Scald one half of the milk and add the soda to it and then the remainder of the milk; then add to the other ingredients.

CRANBERRY PIE
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup cold water
2 cups cranberries
1 tablespoon flour
2 eggs
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons powdered sugar
Cook sugar and water to a syrup; add cranberries. Cook until berries pop; cool a little. Mix smoothly in a bowl the flour and yolks of eggs and 3 tablespoons of the cranberry juice; add this to the berries. Simmer for 3 minutes. Stir in butter and vanilla and set aside to cool. Turn filling into deep pie shell, baked, cover with whites of eggs beaten stiff and powdered sugar. Brown slightly in oven.

FRUIT DROP COOKIES
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 to 2 cups chopped dates
raisins or nuts
Sift the dry ingredients. Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually and mix well. Add eggs well beaten and mix. Sift together dry ingredients and add alternately with the milk. Fold in fruit and nuts. Drop in small spoonful on a buttered bake sheet, allowing space to spread. Bake in moderately hot oven
