LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

Over 6000 cattle arrived for Monday's market, which was one of the heaviest deliveries on record in Toronto for this season of the year, caused a great deal by the arrival of over 4000 cattle from Western Canada, which consisted largely of stockers and feeders, besides quite a number of medium butchers, which sold at lower prices, thus effecting the price on local cattle. There was a scarcity of choice cattle, especially heavy steers, for which there was a good demand for shipment to the United States.

Choice heavy steers brought from \$7.75 to 9.25; fair to good from 8.00 to 8.50; medium 6.50 to 7.50. Choice butcher steers and heifers sold at from 6.75 to 7.00; fair to good from 6.00 to 6.75; common to medium 5.00 to 6.00. Choice baby beefs sold readily at from 9.00 to 10.00. Selected stockers and feeders sold active and steady at from 5.00 to 5.60, while those of medium quality ranged from 4.00 to 4.50; common 3.50. Good butcher cows made from 4.00 to 4.75 and choice heifers cows 4.75 to 5.25; fair to good from 3.50 to 4.00; common to medium 2.75 to 3.25; canners and cutters 2.00 to 2.50. Choice heavy bulls brought from 4.25 to 4.50; bolognas from 3.50 to 4.00.

The lamb market was slow and prices one-half lower. Choice lambs sold on Monday at 11c, with the prospects of lower prices for the balance of the week. Choice light sheep brought from 3.50 to 4.00. The calf trade was very slow, choice calves from 7.00 to 7.50; fair to good from 6.00 to 7.00; common to medium 5.00 to 6.00; grassers 3.50.

The hog market was lower, with truck hogs selling on Monday at 10.00. American markets declined in price and this has affected the local trade. It will depend entirely upon supplies for the balance of the week as to what will take place.

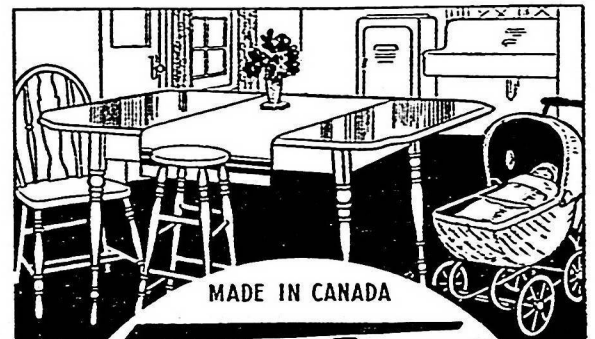
