# LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

DUNN & LEVACK, TORONTO

Supplies of cattle were not quite o heavy for Monday's market, about 5000 here on sale. The market opened with a strong demand for good to choice killing cattle, including cows. American order buyers and exporters of feeder steers to the Old Country, were strong buyers, which had a good effect on the market as a whole.

Best heavy steers sold at from \$.75 to 9.25; fair to good from 7.75 to 8.50. In the butcher section, choice steers and heifers brough from 7.25 to 7.75; fair to good from 6.50 to 7.25; common and medium 5.00 to 6.25; choice baby beeves sold readily at from 10.00 to 10.50, others at lower prices according to quality. Stockers and feeders, especially steers, were in strong demand. Selected light Mrs. Henry, mother of J. C. and Jarvis Henry of this place, passed strong demand. those of heavier weights from 5.75 to 6.25. The cow trade was strong, choice heifery cows from 5.00 to 5.50; best fat butcher cows 4.75 to crosse by a score of 2 to 1. 5.00; fair to good from 3.75 to 4.50; common to medium 2.75 to 3.25; canners and cutters 2.00 to Cows, heavy bulls were in good demand for export at from 4.50 to 5.25; bolognas from 3.50

Lambs opened slow, as buyers were bidding lower prices and finally choice ewe lambs sold at 10.23 with the bucks at 9.25. Best light sheep 3.50 to 4.00. Choice veal calves advanced sharply to a top of 9.00, with those of medium to good quality selling from 7.50 to 8.50; Lake, situated a few miles northcommon 5.00 to 6.00; grass calves 3.50 to 4.00.

Hogs featured the market, advancing to a new high of 10.65 for in hand and last week a line was truck deliveries, being the highest surveyed from the lake to the C.P. price paid since 1930. Supplies have been short and all buyers keen to secure their requirements.
