Will Celebrate Derry Day in Markdale in 1938

At a special meeting of the local Black Preceptory held on Tuesday evening it was decided to hold a celebration in Markdale on August 12th, 1938. This year the closest celebration is at Shelburne and the local members will go there in full strength. In the past few years the members of Markdale Preceptory have attended in full strength celebrations at Brampton, Orangeville, Georgetown, Barrie, Collingwood, Owen Sound and last year at St. Catharines, where about 175 journeyed in four trucks and by car. Markdale is well located for such a celebration and with highways leading in all directions a bumper crowd should be attracted here. Cards will be distributed at Shelburne on Thursday next announcing the celebration and residents of the locality are asked to boost the event.

Michael Foy Drops Dead While Milking

Last week we mentioned briefly the sudden passing of Michael Foy of Euphrasia, on Wednesday morning, July 28th. Worried because her husband did not return to the house for breakfast after milking, Mrs. Foy went to the stable in search of him. In order to keep the young cattle from entering the stable, Mr. Foy had securely barred the door from the inside before commencing to milk and Mrs. Foy met with considerable difficulty in gaining entrance. Inside she was shocked to find her husband lifeless, his body lying back beside the cow he had been milking, and the pail still beneath the cow's udder.

The late Mr. Foy was born on the farm where he died on July 12th, 1861. He had spent his seventy-six years in the one locality where he was well and favorably known and was a successful farmer. He married Miss Barbara Ormsby, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Ormsby, who survives with a daughter, Mrs. E. P. McConvey of Chatsworth, and a son, Otto Foy. There is also one brother, Mr. Hugh Foy of Berkeley.

Mr. Foy had successfully undergone an operation this spring in the Markdale Hospital, but had been troubled with a heart complaint which was the cause of his sudden demise.

The funeral was held on Friday morning, Requiem Mass being held in St. Joseph's Church, Markdale, Rev. Father Grace being in charge. Interment was made in Lakeview Cemetery.
