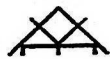

50 YEARS AGO - AUG. 11th, 1887

Local and Other Items

Quite a number of farmers finished cutting grain last week and the great majority are through this week in this district. This is certainly the earliest in the history of the place.

We were pained to learn on Monday last of the sudden death of Mr. Alex. Murdoch, a respectable farmer near Walters Falls, formerly of Euphrasia, near Harkaway. It appears while driving the sulky rake the upper part of the back of the seat chafed his back, and though medical aid was resorted to, it developed into erysipilas, which in less than a week ended his earthly career. He died on Sunday at the age of 39 years. He was a rugged, healthy man and highly respected, and his premature demise has cast a gloom over the community.

James Ward, Incumbent of the English Church of this place, gave his farewell address last Sunday evening to a crowded house, and took his departure on Tuesday for Millbank, 17 miles from Stratford, his new field of labor. Mr. Ward has been a faithful, zealous, persevering man, and for about nine years labored with indomitable energy for the welfare of his Church and congregation, building them up from weakness and disorganization to its present prosperous and well organized state.

HOLLAND TOWNSHIP COUNCIL MINUTES

Holland, August 3rd, 1937.

Council met on above date for the transaction of Township business, all members present. John Heighes, Esq., Reeve presiding.

Minutes of July meeting were read and confirmed.

Following were then read: Statement Owen Sound Hospital re Wm. Widow; Statement Owen Sound Hospital re Fred Routenberg; report of J. McNeely, valuing sheep of Gilbert McInnis, Robt. McFadden, D. Hunt; report of Chris. Routenberg, valuing sheep of Harold Seabrook and John McCartney; several relief accounts totaling \$47.83; applications for the position of Clerk were received from the following: Wesley Troughton, Emerson Craven, W. Morrow, Miss E. Crewson, H. V. Wales, W. S. Sutcliffe, Harold Gillespie, E. D. Gilpin, W. C. Ritchie, J. S. McKoscoek.

Hanna - Dixon—That Robt. Harper be Sanitary Inspector for the balance of 1937 at a fee of \$1.00 for placarding, \$2.00 for disinfecting, at 10c per mile one way.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That the Clerk notify the Owen Sound General and Marine Hospital that we do not consider Wm. Widow and Fred Routenberg as indigent patients and this township will not be responsible for their hospital bills.—Carried.

Hanna - McFadden—That leave be granted to introduce a by-law to appoint a Clerk for Township of Holland.—Carried.

Dixon - Hanna—That report No. 7 of Road Superintendent be passed and Treasurer be authorized to issue cheques for same amounting to \$351.28.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That by-law No. 41 appointing Clerk for Township of Holland be now read a second time.—Carried.

Dixon - Hanna—That this council appoint H. V. Wales as Clerk for the Township of Holland.—Carried.

McFadden - Dixon—That by-law No. 41, appointing Clerk for the Township of Holland, be now read a third time, finally passed, signed by the Reeve and Clerk and engrossed in the By-law Book.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That we instruct the Road Supt. to pay the gravel contractors as he thinks necessary.—Carried.

Gillespie - Hanna—That we strike the tax rates for 1937 as follows: County Rate 9.5 mills; Township Rate 5 mills, exclusive of school rates.—Carried.

Dixon - Hanna—That the Clerk notify the Geo. Bovington family that this township is moving them back to Culross township by Sept. 1st, 1937 and after that date they will receive no more relief.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That the Clerk notify Culross township that this township is moving the Geo. Bovington family back to Culross by Sept. 1st, 1937, and to make arrangements for same.—Carried.

Mr. Hanna presented Finance Report No. 8 of the Finance Committee, recommending payment of \$119.83.

McFadden - Dixon—That report of Finance Committee No. 8, recommending payment of \$119.83 be paid.—Carried.

Council then adjourned until Tuesday, Sept. 7th at one p.m.
