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## Berkeley - Hepworth Tied in Playdowns

Berkeley, Sullivan League champions, got away with the first game of the Rural Softball Association playdowns at Hepworth on Thursday night as they trimmed Hepworth 7 to 6.

For a good part of this game Hepworth were out in front and they looked to be good for a victory but the Berkeley team came up fast in the last inning as they got to pitcher Brown and finished on top with a one-run advantage. Hepworth opened with a single run in the second added two in the third while they blanked the visitors through the fifth. In the sixth Berkeley opened up, shot four runs across the plate with some savage hitting and took the lead.

It didn't last long however and in the seventh Hepworth rallied for another three runs and went two up. Then the game started to get exciting. A one-run inning in the eighth put Berkeley within striking distance. Hepworth was blanked when it came to bat and then the visitors put over two runs and took the lead in their half of the ninth. With Genoa hurling good ball and getting nice support they blanked Hepworth in the last of the ninth to clinch the verdict.

Before the biggest home crowd of the season Berkeley's Sullivan League champions fell apart individually and collectively to absorb the most crushing defeat they have sustained in many years at Berkeley on Saturday night. They lost the second of the rural league playdown to Hepworth 30 to 8.

With the series deadlocked at one game each the teams go to Desboro on Thursday night for the third game of a series that threatened to establish all kinds of records. For two innings it was a ball game and then almost ceased to be. Hepworth was blanked for the first two innings and Berkeley got one run. Then the deluge was unleashed and a Hepworth rally netted eight runs in the third inning. After that it was a parade, the visitors scoring in every inning but the ninth, getting four in each of the third, fourth and eighth and seven in the seventh. Berkeley pecked away at the lead one run at a time and finished with four in the ninth which didn't even matter.

Brown pitched a steady game all the way for the Hepworth club while Genoa, who went three innings, and Mitchell who followed him, were pounded unmercifully.
