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## Berkeley Wins First Round in Softball

Punching out their hits at the right time, Berkeley's clouting Sullivan League champions advanced to the Ontario Rural Softball Association semi-finals at Desboro on Thursday evening as they whipped Hepworth, North Bruce League champs by 7-5 in the third game of their playdown series before the biggest crowd of the season. Berkeley produced the knockout blows in the second and fifth inning with four and three runs respectively.

Behind Archie Macaulay's masterful pitching and with Boales setting off the dynamite with his bat, Berkeley fully deserved their win. Boales had three hits, a homer and double included, drove in five runs to pace his team to victory. Macaulay limited Hepworth to eight hits and his fast ball mowed down 12 batters on strikes. Brown did a good job for Hepworth but Berkeley clipped him for thirteen hits. Brilliant fielding, which included two double plays by the White, Schnurr, Sadler infielder combination, ruined some Berkeley scoring efforts. Schnurr made the feature play of the game, a circus catch of Adams' bid for a hit into short right in the fifth inning.

Berkeley stepped out with a four-run lead in the second. Adams and Singleton rapped out singles and when Boales cracked a double the former scored with Singleton being thrown out at the plate as he tried to stretch it. Ward was safe on a fielder's choice and when Bowler doubled both Boales and Ward scored.

Hepworth picked up their first run in the fourth as Sadler smashed a long homer into deep centre field but the hit failed to shake Macaulay and Berkeley cleaned up with three more runs in the fifth. After Macaulay was thrown out Rowe singled and Schnurr then made his great catch of Adams' lift. Singleton singled and Boales came through with his second hit, a mammoth blow to deepest centre for a home run that cleared the bases and drove in three runs.

Hepworth made its bid in the sixth when a single by Brown and successive doubles by Sadler and Rourke produced three runs, but it wasn't enough to catch up. They got their last in the seventh when White was safe on an error and scored on L. Brannick's long single. Berkeley players were: A. Macaulay, C. Rowe, V. Ward, C. Boales, R. Adams, E. Singleton, A. ## LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

Almost 10,000 cattle arrived for Tuesday market, which is the heaviest offering we have had for one day for a long time. In spite of the fact, that shipments from Western Canada have been liberal during the past three months, another lot of almost 7,000 cattle have arrived during the past few days. The general quality of cattle on offer has not been good and prices were lower. Choice heavy steers, cows and bulls held steady, while all other classes were fully from a quarter to a half lower.

Choice heavy steers sold at from 9.00 to 9.50; fair to good from 7.50 to 8.50. In the butcher section, choice steers and heifers made from 6.75 to 7.25; fair to good from 5.50 to 6.50; common to medium 4.25 to 5.50. Choice baby beefs sold at from 9.00 to 10.00 and those of medium to good quality from 5.50 to 8.50. Stockers and feeders were slow of sale and selected light kind sold at from 4.50 to 5.00 and those of heavier weights at from 5.50 to 6.00; common and medium stockers ranged from 3.50 to 4.25. Choice heifers cows sold at from 4.75 to 5.00 and best fat cows 4.00 to 4.50; common and medium 2.75 to 3.50; canners and cutters 2.25 to 2.65. Best heavy bulls sold at from 4.00 to 4.25; bolognas from 3.25 to 3.75.

The lamb market opened slow and prices lower, choice lambs selling at from 8.75, with the bucks at 7.75. Best light sheep sold from 3.00 to 3.50. Choice veal calves brought from 9.00 to 10.00; fair to good from 7.50 to 8.50; common to medium 5.00 to 6.50.

The hog market has shown considerable strength due to the activity of some of the smaller wholesalers in Toronto and a good outside demand. In spite of lower bids on Tuesday, salesmen were successful in raising the price another quarter, truck deliveries selling at 10.50. Prices for the balance of the week will depend entirely on supplies and outlet to the smaller packers.
