## Cream & Cream Judging COMPETITION

to be held at Markdale Fair  
on the second day, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 1st

Two classes of competition are open:

- (1). To producers of cream:  
In order to enable all producers to take part in this competi-  
tion two contests are provided, with awards of first, second and  
third prizes for each contest. The first set will be given for a can  
containing at least 40 lbs. of special grade cream and the second  
set for a can containing at least 20 lbs. of special grade cream.  
The prizes given will be awarded on basis of quality and cleanliness  
of cream.
- (2). To the junior farmers:  
Three prizes will be awarded for ability to judge cream.  
We urgently ask all cream producers who can enter these  
competitions to do so. You will find it most interesting and profit-  
able because learning how to produce special grade cream means  
dollars and cents to you, with the possibility of winning the prize.  
These competitions will be conducted by instructors from the  
Dairy Dept. of Ontario with the assistance of the local Dept. of Agri-  
culture and the Markdale Creamery.

#### Cream Competition

\$25.00 in Prizes for Class I will be divided as follows:

Can of Cream, weighing 40 lb or over..... \$8 ..... \$5 ..... \$3 .....  
Can of Cream, weighing 20 lb. or over .... \$6 ..... \$4 ..... \$2 .....

#### Rules and Regulations Governing Cream Quality Competition

1. No entry fee for this class required.
2. Cream must be delivered to Markdale Creamery before 2  
p.m. on Friday, Oct. 1st.
3. Only special grade cream is eligible for this contest.
4. A sample will be taken from each special grade can of  
cream by the Dairy Instructor for judging.
5. The samples will then be taken to the Fair and judged by  
the above Instructor.
6. All cream samples will be left at the Fair till 5 p.m. when  
the Creamery will collect same.

#### Boys and Girls Cream Judging Competition

A cream judging competition will be held at the same time.  
The competition will be in charge of the Grey County Branch of  
Dept. of Agriculture and under the auspices of the Markdale Agri-  
cultural Society and the Markdale Creamery with the assistance of  
the Instructor of the Dairy Dept. of Ontario.

\$12.00 in Prizes will be awarded in Cream Judging Competi-  
tion as follows:

Boys and Girls Judging Competition ..... \$6 ..... \$4 ..... \$2 .....

#### Rules and Regulations Governing Cream Judging Competition

1. No entry fee for this class required.
2. Competition open to all boys and girls 12 years of age and  
over.
3. Judging will commence at 3 p.m. in the Secretary's Office  
at the Fair.
4. Ten minutes will be given to judge, place and write remarks  
on grade of cream.
5. Instruction in judging will be given to all who may desire  
same on Saturday, Sept. 18th at 2.30 p.m., in the Dept. of Agricul-  
ture, Markdale.
