### LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

Monday's cattle market opened slow on account of heavy supplies and also lower reports from all other markets. Only a few lots of extra choice steers and heifers brought steady prices; also cows and bulls met with a fair trade. There was a wide range in values on cattle of medium quality and sales were made generally on a lower level.

Choice heavy steers brought from 9.00 to 9.50, with those of medium to good quality from 7.00 to 8.50. Choice butcher steers and heifers sold at from 6.50 to 7.25; fair to good from 5.50 to 6.50; common to medium 4.00 to 5.25; very common 3.00 to 3.50. Stockers and feeders were slow of sale and only a few lots of selected light stockers sold from 4.50 to 5.00, and best feeders of heavier weights from 5.75 to 6.00; common to medium stockers ranged from 3.50 to 4.25. Choice light cows sold at from 4.75 to 5.25. Best heavy fat cows 4.00 to 4.50; fair to good from 3.00 to 4.00; canners and cutters 2.25 to 3.00. The choice butcher bulls sold at from 3.75 to 4.25; bolognas from 3.00 to 3.75. Choice milk cows and springers brought from \$50.00 to \$60.00 each; others very slow of sale.

Supplies of lambs were liberal and buyers insisted on lower prices. Only a few lots of choice ear-load lambs sold at 8.75, with the bulk of



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the sales being made at 8.50. The sheep trade held steady with the choice light kind from 3.50 to 4.50. The calf market declined suddenly on account of much lower reports in the United States. Choice veal calves made from 9.00 to 10.00; fair to good from 7.50 to 8.50; common to medium 5.00 to 7.00; grass calves 4.00.

Hog prices were definitely affected by heavy deliveries to packers and outside points. Monday's sales at Toronto were made on the basis of 10.25 for truck deliveries with prospects of a further decline for the balance of the week.

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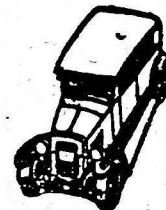
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
