The annual harvest thanksgiving services in connection with Christ Church were held on Sunday last.

Rev. James Ward of Millbank and Miss Fanny Ford of Markdale were married in Christ Church, Markdale, on Wednesday, Sept. 28th, 1887.

The following description of the village of Markdale was written by Arthur W. Rutledge, aged 12 years: "Markdale is a village (not incorporated) in the centre of the county of Grey, an important station on the T., G. and B. branch of the C.P.R., 92 miles from Toronto and 30 from Owen Sound. It is located on the townline of Glenelg and Artemesia townships, about three-fifths in the former and two-fifths in the latter; is about one mile from the boundary of Euphrasia and Holland townships. The Toronto and Sydenham road runs through the village. The land in the vicinity of the town is gently rolling, which gives it natural drainage. It has about 800 inhabitants, who are principally of English, Irish and Scotch origin, pretty equally divided. There are three Churches: English, Presbyterian and Methodist, while the residents are pretty fairly divided between the above three with a few of other sects. The people are enterprising, hospitable and of good morals generally. It has a well conducted public school with three teachers. The village is noted for its good markets and enterprise generally. It depends wholly on the surrounding agricultural country for its support.

A Square Deal for the Public Schools of Ontario: Equal rights to all and special privileges to none.

Submitting the Liquor Question to the electors of Ontario to say by ballot what their will may be.

The re-establishing of the Farm Loan Board and loaning on farm mortgages at three per cent. interest or lower; the interest on all government loans now outstanding to be reduced.

Adjustment of Automobile License Fees so that the owner who drives for but six or seven months will receive a rebate, and the reduction of the gasoline tax to a reasonable figure.

Providing further bonuses so that farmers will receive Hydro Electric Services at lower rates than now in force.

Re-establishment of the Social Services which have been eliminated by the Hepburn government.
