HAS MAJORITY OF 1318 OVER DR. BRAD JAMIESON OF DURHAM

Wednesday's voting in South Grey gave Mr. F. R. Oliver a majority of 1318 over Dr. Brad amieson of Dur ham. The vote was somewhat lighter than in 1934 but generally not much different. In Artemesia Jamieson gained 19 is compared with the vote in 1934; Bentinck 144; Egremont 23; Glenelg 105; Holland 36; Normanby 3; Proton 32; Chatsworth 6; Dundalk 11; Durham 134; Markdale 9. In Euphrasia he was down 67; Osprey 24; Flesherton 11; Hanover 8; Neu

Mr. Oliver was up over his last vote three in Markdale; 9 in Dun-dalk; Neustadt 101. He was flown 101 in Artemesia; 210 in Bentinck; Egremont 100; Euphrasia 99; Glenelg 100; Holland 36; Normanby 26; Osprey 43; Proton 102; Durham 84; Flesherten 16; Hanover 46. In Chatsworth he broke even.

Dr. Jamieson polled the largest vote ever given any candidate in Durham, his home town. Berkeley gave him the largest majority in any single poll in townships. Oliver at Hopeville in Proton township.

Latest returns show the standing to be 67 Liberals and 23 Conservatives Hon. Earl Rowe went down to de feat in Centre Simcoe where he opposed Hon. Dr. Simpson, Minister of Education. Premier Hepburn of Education. had a sweeping victory over his op ponent in the Elgin County riding. Hon. Duncan Marshall, Minister of Agriculture, was defeated in Peel by Hon. T. L. Kennedy. The Minister of health, Hon. Dr. Faulkner. was also defeated.

Cabinet Ministers elected are Hon. T. B. McQuesten, Minister of Highways. Hamilton; Hon. Harry Nixon, Provincial Secretary, Brant; Hon. L. J. Simpson, Minister of Education, in Simcoe Centre; Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of Lands and Forests, Kenora; Hon. C. W. Cox. Minister without portfolio, Port Arthur; Hon. Paul Leduc, Minister of Mines, Ottawa.

In North Grey Roland Patterson was re-elected over Victor Porteous by a majority of 2309. In Dufferin-Simcoe Rev. W. Downer of Duntroon won over Dr. Smith of Creemore by about 700. Dr. James McQuibban was defeated in North Wellington by Mr. McEwing, Liberal. Mr. R. W. E. McFadden was defeated in Brantford by Mr. M. M. McBride. the former member.

The late Dr. R. H. Henderson was a son of the late Robert Henderson and Fanny Watson and was born on the old homestead near Portlaw 77 years ago. He received his early education in the Portlaw school and later attended the Royal College of Dental Surgeons and for many years practiced his profession in Toronto, specializing on exodontia, and retired several pears ago following a pro-longed illness. Since then he had not been enjoying the best of health, but at times was able to come to Flesherton and visit with his relatives and friends in this district who were always pleased to have him call. His cheery disposition and integrity of character will always be remembered by all who knew him. Besides his sorrowing wife he leaves to mourn two sons, Ivan and Eric. He also leaves one brother, Mr. Samuel Henderson of Toronto, the last of a family of nine children. He was a member of Grey Lodge No. 548, A.F. & A.M., Toronto.
