C. N. R. Monthly Statement

Net revenue for the month of August of \$558,530, and an increase of \$4,942,553 on net revenues for the first eight months of this year over the corresponding period of last year, is shown in the monthly statement of operating revenues of the Canadian National Railways. Operating expenses and net revenue all-inclusive system issued at headquarters recently. Operating revenues last month were \$16,485,561, as compared with \$15,733,625 in August, 1936. Operating expenses were \$15,927,031, against \$15,053,044 during the similar period of last year. There was a net revenue last month of \$558,530. For the eight months of the present year, operating revenues were \$128,144,860, against \$116,491,348 in the corresponding period of last year. Operating expenses up to August 31st of this year were \$119,959,483, compared with \$113,248,524 for the similar period of 1936. Net revenues for the eight months period of 1937 were \$8,185,377, compared with \$3,242,824, on increase of \$4,942,553 over the eight months of 1936.

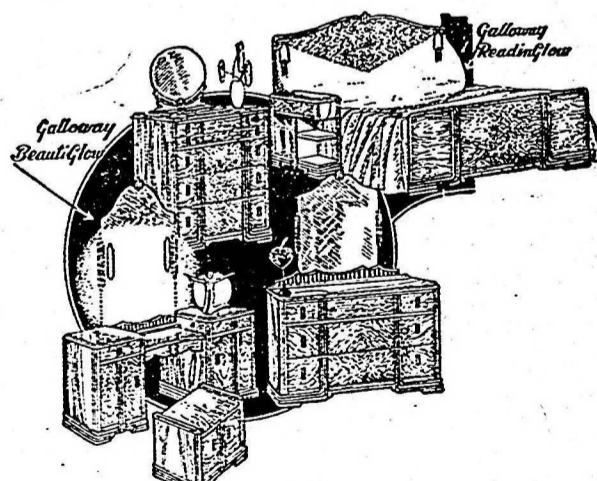
