I believe, from the time when oxen were in commoner use than they are to-day and horses were more of a novelty Visitors to the match will notice that oxen are not overdressed with harness—all they need is the old-fashioned yoke on their necks and a draft chain leading back to the plow. No reins are used, the oxen depending entirely on the spoken word for their guidance. We hope to have several yoke of oxen demonstrating throughout the meet because we have found that this is one of the many popular features in the show."

Entries for the plowing competitions have already been received from points in Michigan, and it is expected that contingents of spectators and contestants will, as in other years, come from many other of the States adjacent to the international The central location of the match at Fergus this year, it was noted, makes accessible from a large part of Ontario and many points in the United States.

Technical talks on the eare of horses, with particular reference to feet, will be given by Dr. C. D. Mc-Gilvray, principal of the Ontario Veterinary College; and practical demonstrations of horse-shoeing will be made by J. McLeod, chief blacksmith of the Ontario Agricultural
