J. J. Pattison.
Much sympathy is felt for the family and relatives of the late Mr. J. J. Pattison, whose sudden death at St. Catharines last Tuesday cast a gloom over a wide circle of friends. For the past three months J. J. has been employed by General Motors of St. Catharines in the construction of electric furnaces for their new plant.
Apparently deep round holes are dug, cement poured in and centred in this is a long iron pipe. Working on a night shift, J. J. had started out for supplies for one of the nearby buildings. No protection or lights had been placed at the holes and in the dark J. J. walked into one. The pipe pierced both abdomen and liver. He was rushed to the hospital and an emergency operation performed in the hope of saving his life, but death came during the operation.
Deceased was 41 years of age and was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Pattison of Toronto and Ceylon. He attended school here and grew up in the village where he made a host of friends by his manner and disposition. In 1914 he enlisted for service overseas and returned home, disabled, just when the Armistice was signed. He has been employed at various jobs since his recovery, but the last three months had been spent with General Motors of St. Catharines. He is survived by his widow, one son Billy and daughter Patricia. Also surviving are his parents, one brother, William of Toronto and one sister, Mrs. Gordon Stuart, Ceylon.
The funeral was held in Toronto on Friday, the body resting in Thompson's Funeral Home upon its arrival from St. Catharines, later being laid to rest in Prospect Cemetery, Toronto. The Canadian Legion, of which deceased was a member, attended in a body and took part in the service.

LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

The cattle market has held about the same this week, with the exception of cows, which are selling fully a quarter lower. Receipts were not quite so heavy from Western Canada and this was of considerable help to the sale of Ontario cattle. Quite a number of good steers were bought for export to the United States.
A few of the best weighty steers brought from 8.00 to 9.00, with the bulk of the sales of fair to good from 6.00 to 7.50. Choice butcher steers and heifers sold at from 5.50 to 6.50; fair to good from 4.50 to 5.50; common and medium 3.50 to 4.25. Choice baby heaves sold at lower prices, ranging from 9.00 to 10.00, with those of medium to good quality from 5.50 to 7.50. Stockers and feeders were in fair demand, choice light kind from 4.25 to 4.75 and feeders of heavier weights from 5.50 to 6.00; fair to good stockers from 3.50 to 4.25. Choice light heifers cows brought from 4.50 to 5.00; good heavy cows from 3.75 to 4.25; fair to good from 2.75 to 3.50. Canners and cutters 2.25 to 2.75. Choice butcher bulls from 3.75 to 4.25; bolognas from 3.00 to 3.65.
The lamb market was very slow and lower prices had to be accepted, with prospects of further declines. Choice ewe lambs sold at 7.75, with the bucks at 6.75. Best light sheep from 3.50 to 4.25. The calf trade was stronger, due to good export outlet, choice calves selling from 9.50 to 10.00; fair to good from 7.50 to 9.00; common to medium 5.50 to 7.00; grassers 4.00.
Hogs declined sharply, selling at 9.25 for truck deliveries. All outside markets were reported much lower, making it impossible to uphold the price level on the open market. Further declines are likely to be expected during the balance of the week.
