## The Art of Making Tea

To get the utmost in flavour and quality from tea is an art, but it is an art in which anyone can produce a masterpiece by following these simple directions:

Run the 'cold' tap a few seconds before filling your kettle (never use stale water or water from the 'hot' tap). See that the water is boiling furiously and not just steaming. Scald out a crockery tea-pot, measure in to it a teaspoonful of good quality tea for each person and one for the pot, add the boiling water and steep for five minutes before serving.

Nothing else soothes our tired bodies or gives us the same comfort and pleasure that we get from a good cup of tea. Surely it is worth our while to make it carefully.

½ cup raisins  
½ teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
3 cups flour.  
Mix dough and roll into two rolls about the size of catsup bottles. Chill overnight, slice and bake.

### SNOW CAKE

¾ cup butter  
2 scant cups sugar  
1 cup milk  
¼ teaspoon salt  
1½ teaspoons baking powder  
7 egg whites, beaten stiff  
1 cup corn starch and 2 cups of flour mixed together  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cream butter and sugar. Add salt. Add milk gradually, mixing in well. Then add baking powder and flour mixture gradually. Lastly add vanilla and fold in beaten egg whites. Do not beat too much. Takes about 40 minutes to bake in a moderate oven.

grated rind and juice of one lemon  
Bring to a boil. While on point of boiling put first mixture in centre of liquid. Do not stir. Put in oven and bake ½ an hour. Oven hotter than medium.

## LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

Although supplies of cattle were not quite so heavy for Monday's market, the market was inclined to be slow and prices generally no better than the close of last week. The offering consisted of a large number of stockers, which met with a fair demand.

There were no choice heavy steers on offer and the bulk of the sales were made at from 6.00 to 7.50, with those of medium quality from 5.00 to 6.00. Choice butcher steers and heifers sold at from 5.00 to 5.75, with a few extras at slightly higher prices; fair to good butchers sold at from 4.50 to 5.25; common to medium 3.00 to 4.00; boners 2.50 to 3.00. A few very fancy choice babies brought from 9.00 to 10.00, but the balance of the offering sold at from 4.50 to 7.00. Choice light stockers made from 4.25 to 4.50 and short keep feeders from 5.00 to 5.50; fair to good stockers from 3.50 to 4.00; common to medium 3.00 to 3.50. The cow trade was slow, a few extra choice cows selling from 4.00 to 4.25, with those of fair to good quality from 3.50 to 4.00; common to medium 2.50 to 3.00; cutters and canners 1.75 to 2.25. Choice heavy bulls 3.50 to 4.00; bolognas from 3.00 to 3.50.

In the small meats, choice ewe lambs brought from 7.75 to 8.00, with the bucks at a discount of \$1.00. Choice light sheep held steady at from 4.00 to 4.50. The calf market was active, with choice calves from 9.00 to 10.00; fair to good from 7.00 to 8.50; common to medium 5.00 to 6.50; grass calves 4.25.

The hog market opened very slow on Monday and sales were made at from \$0.00 to \$1.15 for truck deliveries. Prospects look uncertain for the balance of the week.

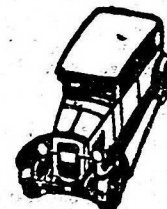
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
