Honour came to the Markdale Public School this week when the results of the Penmanship Contest, sponsored by the Toronto Daily Star, were announced in Tuesday evening's Star.

This contest was province-wide and was divided into six classes Junior and Senior Fourth of the Public School and Forms One, Two Three and Four of the High School. In each class there were four substantial money prizes given. It is interesting to note that all twenty-four prizes were won by girls while only five boys among the thirty-six other contestants received honourable mention. Some 25,000 entries were made from the cities, towns, villages and rural sections of Ontario, but practically all the prizes went to pupils of Toronto and its suburbs.

Doris Wood, aged 13, a Senior Fourth pupil in the local Public School, had the distinction of being placed first in the list of six for honourable mention in her class which is a great honour considering the thousands of entries from all over Ontario. Doris also received first prize for her writing this past summer at the Canadian National Exhibition when she was a Junior Fourth pupil.

Death of Father of Alfred Pickles In England

The following, reporting the death of Mr. C. A. Pickles, father of Mr. Alfred Pickles of the Power House, is taken from the London (England)

The funeral took place at the City of London Cemetery on Monday of Mr. C. A. Pickles, who will be remembered by many in the district as chief engineer of the Whipps Cross Hospital.

the Thames Ironworks, took over his duties at Whipps Cross in 1906, and for 25 years laboured unceasingly to bring the maintenance and services of the hospital under his charge to that high state of efficiency for which it has long been renowned. His tenure of office included the anxious war years, and it is no secret that his unremitting labours during this period, with depleted staff and augmented duties, brought about his early retirement on a breakdown, pension in 1931.

Whilst at hospital Mr. Pickles found time for many outside inter-ests. He was a prominent Freemason and chairman of the Institution of Engineers-in-charge. In these activities, as well as in his daily duties, Mr. Pickles manifested that tact, energy and enterprise which characterized everything to which he set his hand. On his retirement he went to live at Wickford, where he gave full expression to one of his greatest hobbies, gardening, in spite of continued illness necessitating everal minor operations. He was taken ill with a chill on the 5th inst., which developed into pneumonia and died on the 9th inst.

The funeral was marked by demonstration of the affection he had inspired in a large circle of friends in very varied walks of life. There was a large number of beautiful floral tributes from relatives, former colleagues, associates and employees, and every organization with which the late Mr. Pickles had been connected was represented at the service and interment.
