LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

Monday's cattle market opened slow on account of an unexpected heavy run from Eastern Ontario, which was diverted to Toronto on account of the strike amongst packing house employees at Montreal. However, there was a fair demand for cattle of good choice quality at steady prices, while other classes were about a quarter lower.

Only a few lots of choice heavy steers sold at over eight cents, the most of the fair to good heavy steers bringing from 5.50 to 7.00. Choice handy-weight steers and heifers brought from 5.50 to 6.00 with a few extra choice up to 6.50; fair to good butchers from 4.50 to 5.50; common to medium 3.50 to 4.25; boners 3.00. Choice baby heaves brought from 9.00 to 10.00, with those of fair to good quality from 5.50 to 7.00. Stockers and feeders held steady for those of selected breed; light kind from 4.50 to 5.00, and feeders of heavier weights from 5.00 to 5.50; fair to good light stockers from 4.00 to 4.50; common to medium 3.00 to 3.75. The cow trade held up fairly well: choice from 4.00 to 4.50; fair to good from 3.00 to 4.00; common to medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 2.00 to 2.50. Bulls steady: choice light butchers from 3.75 to 4.25; bolognas 3.00 to 3.50.

Lambs opened slow on account of heavy supplies and best ewes sold at 7.50 with a few choice carloads at 7.75; bucks and heavies discounted \$1.00 per cwt. Choice light sheep 4.00 to 4.50; other's lower according to quality. The calf market was strong on account of a good export demand: choice veal calves from 9.50 to 10.00; fair to good from 7.00 to 8.50; common to medium 5.00 to 6.50; grassers 4.00 to 4.25.

The hog market held strong at \$50 for truck deliveries on Monday and the trade for the balance of the week would be dependable entirely upon supplies.

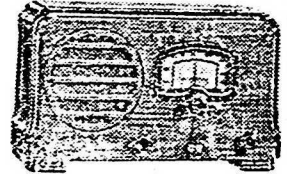

Reports were received from live stock valuers as follows: Wm. Rice, valuing sheep of J. Unwin; G. J. McNeely, valuing sheep of Gilbert McInnis, David Hundt and Chas. Tibbutt; Wm. Erwin, valuing sheep of Thomas Clark.

A request was received from John Sowerby for refund on account of loss by fire.

Gillespie - McFadden—That we refund County and Township rates to John Sowerby, amounting to \$54.00, owing to loss by fire.—Carried.

McFadden - Hanna—That the Treasurer receive from Wilbert Sutcliffe the sum of \$4.50 for lumber used by hockey club.—Cd.

Gillespie - Dixon—That this Council instruct the Road Superintendent to purchase 2000 feet of snow fence to be distributed through the Township.—Carried.

McFadden - Gillespie—That the Road Superintendent's Pay Sheet No. 10, for the sum of \$758.43, be paid and the Treasurer issue cheques for same.—Carried.

Gillespie - Dixon—That Telephone By-Law be left over till next meeting.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That report of Finance Committee, for the sum of \$202.64, be adopted as read.—Carried.

Council then adjourned until Dec. 15th at 10 a.m.
