Early Thursday morning she suffered a stroke and after a week's severe suffering, passed away at an early hour on Thursday.

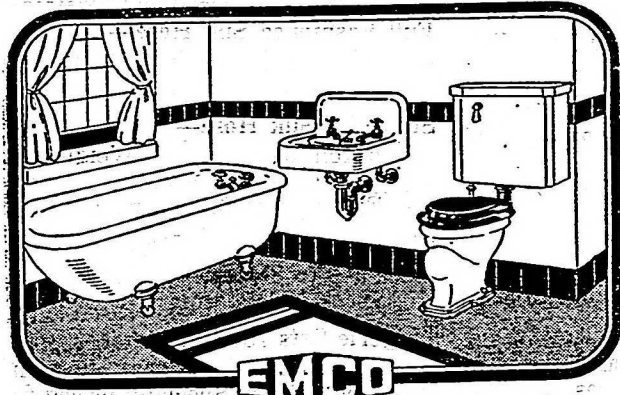

Sincere sympathy is expressed to the sorrowing relatives in their bereavement.

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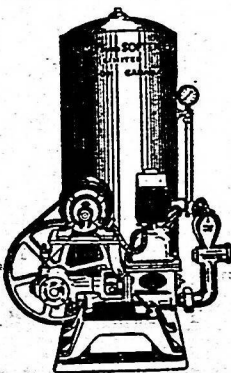
