Premiums for Rams

Many Grey County farmers have recently purchased Graded Rams. All those purchasing such are entitled to a premium from the Federal Live Stock Branch, Sheep Division.

The premium is dependent upon the age and grade of ram as follows:
Shearling Ram - XXX - \$10.00
Ram Lamb - XXX - \$6.00
Shearling Ram - XX - \$6.00
Ram Lamb - XX - \$4.00
Some purchasers of graded rams in previous years have not received their premiums for two reasons:

1. Application was not forwarded to Mr. Jas. A. Telfer, Paris, before Dec. 31st of the year in which the ram was purchased. This must be done. All sheep breeders who had their rams graded received the forms for making application from the grader when he inspected the stock. Be sure you get your application from him when purchasing the ram. If the breeder has no forms, get in touch, before New Year's, with the Grey County Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Markdale.

2. Pedigrees have not been sent away. Remember, the pedigree must reach Mr. Jas. A. Telfer, Paris, not later than Jan. 31st, or one month after the application has been sent forward.

Every farmer entitled to receive the premium must act promptly. Be sure your application reaches Mr. Telfer previous to Dec. 31st, and the pedigree, if not sent with the application, not later than Jan. 31st. If you are not sure get in touch with the Grey County Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Markdale, at once.

Ontario Department of Highways Distributes White Cross Emblems

All the License Issuing Offices of the Motor Vehicles Branch, Ontario Department of Highways, are now supplied with White Cross emblems and Safety Pledges, for distribution to motorists who wish to enroll in the White Cross Safe Driving Movement.

Official posters are displayed in these offices, inviting the public to co-operate in this Safety Campaign, and announcing that each motorist who wishes to do so, may obtain a White Cross emblem for his motor vehicle by asking the clerk in charge for one. The emblems are not being handed to every person who calls for a 1938 license plate, as the directors of this public movement are in agreement with the officials of the Department of Highways that a promiscuous distribution would tend to defeat the very purpose of this Campaign. By displaying the White Cross on his motor vehicle, the licensed operator signifies his intention to observe the simple rules of safe driving contained in the Pledge of the White Cross Driver.

There is actually no pledge to sign, but with each emblem is handed to the motorist a booklet containing the Pledge, and by the simple act of affixing the emblem to his car, the motorist obligates himself to its observance.

Already over 150,000 White Cross emblems have been forwarded to individual motorists, business houses and other organizations, for the enrollment of employees or members, and the Committee in charge estimates that well over 100,000 motor vehicles are now displaying the White Cross emblem in Ontario. A large portion of these emblems have been attached to 1937 markers and at this time of year, when so many owners of cars are changing their old license plates for their 1938 markers, the Committee of the White Cross Safe Driving Movement is anxious that the emblems already dis-

The cost of providing a sufficient number of emblems for the motor vehicles of all motorists in Ontario who wish to join the Movement, is very considerable, and if for no other reason, the principle of ordinary economy dictates that these emblems should not be destroyed when 1938 license plates are secured. In addition to this consideration, the increasing interest and growing importance of the White Cross Safe Driving Movement will be the better served by the greatest possible use of all the emblems distributed, as well as those not yet issued by the Department of Highways or other distributing agencies. The White Cross emblem is intended to act as a constant reminder on the streets and highways, of the motorist's individual responsibility when driving a motor car.

Therefore, the greater the number of emblems in actual use by motorists on their 1937 and 1938 license markers, the more effective becomes this crusade to help reduce the appalling toll of accidents on streets and highways.

GLENELG COUNCIL

The final session for 1937 was held in the Township Hall on Saturday, December 11th, with all members present, the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of the November 13th meeting were read and passed.

Communications were read as follows: Anglo Canadian Underwriters Ltd., Toronto, re Middleton; Canadian Mothercraft Society, re work carried on by Society, and appeal; from Unemployment Relief Branch, Public Welfare Dept., re unemployed; from W. E. Harris, re deeds; from Dept. of Municipal Affairs, re Method of Collecting Taxes in Grey Co., and Glenelg; from F. R. Oliver, M.L.A., asking for suggestions as to future Legislation that would be constructive and practical to lay before Government at coming session of Legislature.

The Road Supt. presented Voucher No. 12, for payments made for work performed on roads, amounting to \$754.53, which was passed and payments ordered on motion of Messrs. D'Arcy and Sullivan.

A. D'Arcy, one day re roads, \$2.50; Department of Health, Insulin account, \$3.35; W. J. Ritchie, balance salary as Treasurer, \$60, preparing Treasurer's Statement, \$15.00; H. H. MacDonald, balance salary as Clerk, \$75.00, telephone account \$1.37; Donald O'Neill, balance salary as caretaker of Township Hall, \$5.00; A. A. McVicar, relief account, \$15.37; Mrs. J. Leitch, relief account, \$1.76; A. A. Aljoe, relief account, \$11.33; Chas. McFarlane, for attendance on Marcelles family while quarantined for scarlet fever, \$10.00; John Quillinan, for wood supplied for family on relief, \$5.62; To the several Boards of School Trustees, approximately one-half of General and Trustees' Levies amounting to the sum of \$4491.64; Election Expenses for Municipal Election held December 6th, 1937, as follows: 5 Deputy Returning Officers at \$4.00 each, \$20.00; 5 Poll Clerks at \$2.00 each, \$10.00; Trustees S.S. No. 9, polling place, \$4.00; A. A. McArthur, polling place, \$4.00; S. H. Wright, polling place, \$4.00; Jas. Ellison, polling place, \$4.00; H. H. MacDonald, delivering ballot boxes, \$4.00.

The Treasurer was authorized to erase from his books, by resolution of Messrs. D'Arcy - Robinson, arrears of taxes amounting to the sum of \$119.65, the same having been paid. Robinson - D'Arcy - That this Council deem some action should be taken by the C. P. R. to have the crossing at the Glen made safer for traffic; that the Supt. be instructed to have all brush that obstructs the view at railway crossings removed for a distance of 500 feet on either side of crossing and that Clerk be instructed to write C. P. R. authorities in accordance with the first part of this resolution.—Carried.

Crutchley - Robinson—That this Council do now adjourn, that the Reeve be asked to vacate the chair and that the same be taken by Mr. E. J. Sullivan.—Carried.

Mr. Sullivan accordingly took the chair and after a brief address called on the Reeve and all members of the Council who each responded briefly, each stressing the note of good fellowship which had obtained throughout the year, although at variance in opinions at certain times, and each voiced for the new Council Elect for 1938 a successful and prosperous year for the Township as a whole.

RASPBERRY BAVARIAN CREAM

1½ tablespoons gelatine
½ cup boiling water
¼ cup cold water
¼ cup white sugar
1½ cups raspberries, drained of juice or syrup (use orange juice instead or any juice)
1 tablespoon lemon juice
½ cup cream whipped or 2 egg whites
Soften gelatine in cold water. Dissolve in boiling water. Stir until dissolved; add raspberries, rubbed through sieve and lemon juice. Let stand until it begins to thicken. Then fold in cream or egg whites. Turn into mould. Let stand until firm. Serve very cold with whipped cream.

BANANA CUP CAKES

½ cup butter
1 cup sugar
1 cup mashed bananas
1½ cups pastry flour
1 egg, well beaten
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream butter and sugar, add egg, well beaten, and stir in mashed bananas. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with soda, dissolved in a little hot water. Bake in greased small muffin tins in hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 15 minutes. Cool and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Makes 18 small cakes.

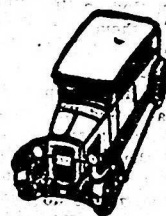
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
