**LIVE STOCK
MARKET REPORT**

A very light supply of cattle ar-
rived for Monday's market, being
about equal to the present outlet
and the trade was active and prices
from 15 to 25c. higher. The best
demand was shown for choice handy
weight butchers and a few fancy
baby heeves for the Christmas trade.

A few heavy steers sold at slight-
ly better prices, the bulk of the sales
ranging from 6.00 to 7.00, with
those of medium to good quality
from 5.00 to 6.00. Choice butcher
steers and heifers brought from
5.50 to 6.00, with a few extras at
slightly higher prices; fair to good
kind from 4.50 to 5.25; common to
medium 3.75 to 4.25. Choice baby
beeves from 8.00 to 9.00; fair to
good from 5.50 to 7.50. Stockers
and feeders were slow of sale, as
there was very little demand for
them. Choice butcher cows sold at
from 3.50 to 4.00, with a few extras
up to 4.50; fair to good from 3.00
to 3.50; common to medium 2.50 to
3.00; canners and cutters 2.00 to
2.50. Bulls held steady with choice
butchers from 4.00 to 4.25; fat
heavy bulls 3.75 to 4.00; bolognas
3.25 to 3.50. Milch cows and
springers were very slow of sale.

In the small meats the lamb
trade was draggy with choice truck
deliveries selling at 7.75 for choice
ewes. Choice butcher sheep from
4.00 to 4.50 with others at lower
prices accordingly. The calf market
was strong with choice calves from
10.00 to 10.50; fair to good from
8.00 to 9.50; common and medium
5.50 to 7.00.

Monday's hog market was active
and stronger, compared to the close
last week with truck deliveries sell-
ing on the basis of 8.25, with pros-
pects of a steady market for the
balance of the week.

waiting for the dam to commence.

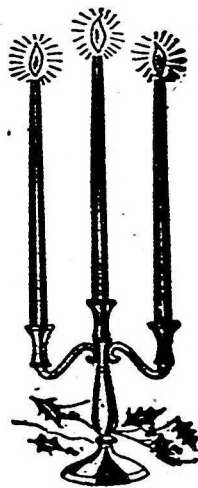

HOLLAND TOWNSHIP COUNCIL MINUTES

Holland, December 15th, 1937

Council met in the Township Hall on above date for the trans-
action of Township business. All members were present and John
Heighes, Esq., Reeve, presided.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The following were read: Communications from Department of
Highways and F. R. Oliver, M.L.A.; reports from Live Stock Valu-
ers as follows: G. J. McNeely, valuing sheep of E. Quinn and R. Mc-
Fadden; Wm. Erwin, valuing sheep of Matt. Farley; report of Weed
Inspector, W. J. Wright; report of School Attendance Officer, A.
Gillespie.

Hanna - McFadden—That this Council instruct the Clerk to write
the Hon. M. F. Hepburn, Premier, the Hon. E. W. Cross, Minister of
Municipal Affairs, and Mr. F. R. Oliver, M.L.A., stating that this
Council feels that it is unfair that a share of the cost of conducting
the Provincial election should be levied on the municipalities and
that they feel that the Province should bear the entire cost of con-
ducting the election.—Carried.

Gillespie - Dixon—That leave be granted to introduce a By-Law
to appoint Deputy-Returning Officers and Poll Clerks for the Town-
ship of Holland for 1938. Leave granted and By-Law read.

McFadden - Hanna—That By-Law No. 43 be read a second time.
—Carried.

Gillespie - Dixon—That By-Law No. 43, for the purpose of ap-
pointing Deputy-Returning Officers and Poll Clerks for the year
1938, be now read a third time, finally passed, signed by the Reeve
and Clerk and engrossed in the By-Law book.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That we refund County and Township
taxes to John Hamilton, amounting to \$33.75 owing to loss by fire.
—Carried.

Gillespie - Dixon—That the Clerk be instructed to write the
Secretary of Grey County Mothers' Allowances Board to ask for in-
formation regarding the Mothers' Allowances Act.—Carried.

McFadden - Gillespie—That this Council take no action in regard
to John McLean's assessment, lot 1, con. 7, E.G.R., Holland.—Cd.

Dixon - Hanna—That we refund Robert Acheson \$7.60, owing to
error in assessment.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That the Treasurer accept \$10.01 from
the Caretaker, proceeds from rent of hall.—Carried.

Hanna - McFadden—That the Road Superintendent's Pay Sheet
No. 11, for the sum of \$963.05 be paid and the Treasurer issue his
cheques for the same.—Carried.

Gillespie - McFadden—That this Council refund \$1.00 dog tax to
Geo. Kinney, Robert Slade and John Broadfoot.—Carried.

Hanna - Dixon—That the Treasurer be authorized to give the
Tax Collector credit for discount allowed on second instalment of
taxes.—Carried.

Gillespie - Hanna—That the Clerk notify Mrs. Stuart Free that
this Council only agreed to pay for the upkeep of the Skinner child-
ren at the rate they formerly had received.—Carried.

Dixon - Hanna—That the Bell Telephone By-Law be placed on
file for the present.—Carried.

Gillespie - Hanna—That the Reeve and Clerk be a committee to
interview Moore and Black regarding settlement of gravel crushing
contract and that the Council retain cheque until notified by com-
mittee.—Carried.

McFadden - Gillespie—That Report No. 12 of Finance Committee
be adopted as read for the sum of \$1212.87.—Carried.
On motion the Reeve left the chair, when it was moved by Mr.
McFadden, seconded by Mr. Gillespie, that the thanks of this
Council be tendered to our Reeve, Mr. John Heighes, for the effi-
cient and impartial manner in which he has presided over this Coun-
cil for the past year and we all join in wishing him a merry Christ-
mas and a happy and prosperous New Year.—Carried.
This was tendered to Mr. Heighes by the Deputy-Reeve, Mr. Geo.
Hanna, to which he fittingly replied after which all joined in sing-
ing the National Anthem and the Council adjourned "Sine Die".
