Anglican Churches Hold Annual Vestry Meetings

St. Matthias' Church, Berkeley

The annual meeting of the Vestry was held in the Church on Monday afternoon, Jan. 17th. The Treasurer's report showed that not only had the usual requirements for local support and the paying of the Diocesan budget in full been met, but a Golden Jubilee Fund of \$342.29 had been raised for church repairs and renovations, making 1937 a banner year in the financing of St. Matthias' Church.

A motion expressing regret at the loss by death of William Hampton and appreciation of almost twenty-nine years of service as Church Warden and two years as Honorary Warden was passed unanimously. The long and valued service of Thomas Mitchell was also stressed when he was re-appointed Honorary Warden. Another motion voiced appreciation of all those forwarding the Golden Jubilee Campaign, special mention in this connection being made of the Church Wardens and of the Vestry Clerk, especially to E. D. Gilpin for supervising church repairs. There was also a vote of appreciation of all organizations and workers, namely: the Ladies' Guild, Sunday School officers, Select Vestry, Church Wardens and Vestry Clerk, special mention being made of the valued services of the two organists and the long and much appreciated service of Andrew Gillespie as Sunday School Treasurer.

A communication from Bishop Seeger was read intimating that the assessment of all parishes for the Diocesan Budget should be increased as the General Synod had informed the Diocesan Bishops that the work of the Church could not be efficiently carried on on the previous, or "Depression Budgets", the 1938 assessment for St. Matthias' Church being \$10 higher than that of 1937.

By the nomination and election of the people Harold Gillespie and John Sowerby were appointed as Church Wardens for 1938, the former being designated Minister's Warden and the latter People's Warden.

Flesherton Editor Still Active At 78 Years

Sixty-one years ago, Mr. W. H. Thurston, editor of The Flesherton Advance, got his first newspaper job. Last Thursday night, in his seventy-ninth year, he was sitting at the press table in Toronto with his pad and pencil beside him. He was covering the annual banquet of the Flesherton Old Boys' and Girls' Association at the Victoria Hotel.

"The newspaper was in my blood when I was a lad of 17," he confided to younger colleagues of the press, "and it's still there. Maybe you youngsters don't feel that way yet, but, mark my words, it gets you."

There was no reason why Mr. Thurston should have been working at that banquet. He was one of the guests. And he and his wife had been given a royal welcome because it happened they were celebrating their fifty-fourth wedding anniversary that day.

But Mr. Thurston is editor of the Flesherton Advance, and he was seeing to it that his paper got a good story on the banquet. So his pad and pencil went to work. He is the oldest active newspaperman in Grey County.

He was born within five miles of Flesherton. The urge to write came to him when he was 12 years of age. And following that came the desire to own a newspaper. So he set out to learn the trade, and got his first job in Orangeville as a compositor. He worked on the Toronto World and The Globe. Fifty years ago he realized his ambition by buying the Flesherton Advance.

There are a number of our subscribers who have allowed their subscription to fall in arrears, and for these we have a little message.

It takes money to pay for paper and other supplies we buy as well as for electric power and light, fuel, insurance, taxes, interest on mortgage and living expenses, and unless you come across with the needed we are out of luck. Most newspapers are increasing their rates. To date we have made no decision to do so, but unless arrears are paid within a reasonable period we shall be compelled to charge the two dollar rate. All arrears paid during the months of January, February and March will be accepted at \$1.50 per year in Canada and \$2.00 in the United States. After the end of March \$2.00 will be charged where the subscription is six months or more in arrears in Canada and \$2.50 in the United States.

The Late John Weber Was A Pioneer of Artemesia

John Weber died at the home of his son, D. L. Weber, Kimberley, on Saturday, January 1st, 1938. He had a slight stroke about three months ago but recovered and was in fair health until a week before he died.

He was born near Seaford in Huron County and when he was 12 years old came, with his father and mother, to the Vandeleur section. The names of his parents, William J. Weber and Margaret Weber, are inscribed on the Pioneer Monument of S.S. No. 11, Artemesia. His wife, before her marriage Isabella C. Graham, died twelve years ago. He is survived by four sons and three daughters: Will at Vandeleur, Frank and Dave at Kimberley, John at Weberville, Peace River; Mrs. Wm. Barnhouse (Elizabeth), Edmonton; Mrs. Foy Marshall (Mamie), Toronto; Mrs. Ran. Bradey (Mina), near Markdale. There are also thirty-two grandchildren and forty-six great grandchildren.

He was widely known throughout the district and for many years carried mail from Flesherton to Vandeleur.

For thirty-two years he was a member of the 31st Regiment, completing his term as Staff Sergeant many years ago and was the owner of a Long Service Medal. In early years he was secretary of the Grey Division Grange. In politics he was a Liberal.

The funeral, in charge of Rev. S. McCauslan of the United Church at Kimberley, was from the home of his son, D. L. Weber, to the Markdale Cemetery. The pallbearers were grandsons, namely: Merle and Billie Weber, Jack Bradey, Ellis, Wane and Lee Weber.

He was very active and alert for his advanced years and had visited here every summer for many years. He attended the old home week celebration at Flesherton two years ago and met many old friends, who he thoroughly enjoyed. He was keenly interested in public affairs and an active member of Norfolk Street United Church. In politics he was a staunch Conservative. Three weeks previous to his death he suffered a heart attack while at his work at the mill and the next day he was moved to the hospital, where with other complications which he suffered, resulted in his death as above stated.

He was married 56 years ago to his now bereaved wife, who is in frail health, and with one son, Willmott, and one daughter, Mrs. Taylor (Annie), are left to mourn a kind husband and father. He is also survived by one brother, Wesley, of Toronto and one sister, Mrs. F. R. Blair (Maria), of Rocanville, Sask. The eldest brother, John, of Euphrasia passed away almost 9 years ago.
