The members of the Council of Euphrasia Township for the year 1938 are H. Dawn, Reeve; H. E. Parker, J. J. Miller, L. S. Pottage and H. G. Press, Councillors.

The said members-elect assembled at the Township Hall on above date at the hour of eleven o'clock a.m. and took their seats at the Council Board.

Mr. Wilfred Hall gave a short address. Scriptural reading and prayer to open the new year's business.

The several members took their respective oaths of office.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Communications were read.

Parker - Pottage—That bill of County Office Supply Co. for binder and re-fills for minutes and by-laws, amounting to \$12.97, be paid.—Cd.

Miller - Press—That J. H. Irwin, Fred Wodehouse and Wm. Curry be each paid the sum of \$1.00 for fence-viewing as said amount has been collected from Richard Theakson.—Carried.

Parker - Miller—That printing contract be renewed with The Markdale Standard.—Carried.

Parker - Miller—That the Clerk procure the necessary dog tags and assessment supplies.—Carried.

Miller - Press—That By-Law No. 1, borrowing the necessary money, be now read a first time.—Carried.

Pottage - Parker—That By-Law No. 1 be now read a second and third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Press - Miller—That the Clerk be instructed to notify all ratepayers through the local papers to have all taxes paid on 1938 Roll by April 1st as arrears must be sent to the County Treasurer on or before April 10th.—Carried.

Parker - Miller—That the Clerk be authorized to procure the Revised Statutes of Ontario at a cost of \$15.—Carried.
