## Flesherton Defeats Shelburne and Ties Dundalk at Hockey

### A REAL CONTEST IS DEVELOPING IN CENTRE GREY HOCKEY LEAGUE SERIES

At Flesherton on Friday night last the Shelburne squad were defeated by the Flesherton boys by a score of 7 to 3. It was a Centre Grey Hockey League fixture and attracted a goodly number of spectators.

In the first period six goals were scored, Flesherton getting four and Shelburne two. George Boyd got the first one for Flesherton when he took the puck at the face off and worked his way into the Shelburne territory. The Dufferin boys got number two but Boyd and Patton each counted one in short order. Shelburne came back with another counter which was evaded when Smith scored another for the home team.

Shelburne got the only counter in the second frame.

In the final period Harold McCutcheon counted twice for Flesherton and Smith once, making the final score: Flesherton 7; Shelburne 3.

When Dundalk and Flesherton met on the latter's ice on Tuesday evening they battled through the regulation time and overtime to end the game with a five all score. It was a real test of superiority which ended without a decision.

Dundalk grabbed off two in the first period before the home team realized they were taking part in a hockey match, but before it was over Harold McCutcheon and Fred Gorell got one each to end the period 2-2.

In the second frame Dundalk went out in front again but Smith evaded up. The southerners again scored and Patton came back with another counter and the period ended 4-4.

The third period was scoreless but in the overtime Dundalk secured a counter which was evaded up by Boyd and the game was over with the score 5-5.

Roy Singleton of this place was in charge of both games and gave entire satisfaction. He kept the boys playing hockey all the time and at the close of the last game one of the Flesherton supporters remarked that "Buck's" refereeing was the best seen in Flesherton in a long time while two of the Dundalk enthusiasts told us that Singleton's performance was fair and square from start to finish.

Markdale goes to Dundalk on Friday night when they hope to make the home team step some or bow to defeat.

Shelburne comes here Monday night when a record crowd will be on hand to see the boys do their stuff.

## To Subscribers in Arrears

There are a number of our subscribers who have allowed their subscription to fall in arrears, and for these we have a little message:

It takes money to pay for paper and other supplies we buy as well as for electric power and light, fuel, insurance, taxes, interest on mortgage and living expenses, and unless you come across with the needed we are out of luck. Most newspapers are increasing their rates. To date we have made no decision to do so, but unless arrears are paid within a reasonable period we shall be compelled to charge the two dollar rate. All arrears paid during the months of January, February and March will be accepted at \$1.50 per year in Canada and \$2.00 in the United States. After the end of March \$2.00 will be charged where the subscription is six months or more in arrears in Canada and \$2.50 in the United States.

If you pay during January your name will be placed on a card (one for each year you pay) and dropped into a ballot box. At the end of the month three cards will be drawn from the box and those whose names are on the cards drawn will receive The Standard for one year free. This will be continued in February and March. PAY NOW AND SAVE MONEY.

## Some Things the County Council Did Last Week

Received the County Treasurer's Report showing a deficit of \$30,011.45.

Decided to hold four sessions during the year, the extra session to be held early in April. It is proposed to transact the business in fourteen days whereas under the former arrangements it took seventeen days.

Appointed Trustees for the several High Schools in the County. T. H. Wilson is the appointee in Markdale; Roy Piper in Flesherton; Dr. F. Martin in Dundalk, and W. G. Firth in Durham.

Appropriated \$60,000 for the construction of roads in the County and \$100,000 for the repair and maintenance of the same.

Granted \$2820.00 for the maintenance of the Children's Shelter in Owen Sound; gave \$300 to the Salvation Rescue Home in London, and \$150 to the Canadian Institute for the Blind.

Paid \$3123.75 for indigent patients in several hospitals.
