GLENELG COUNCIL

The first meeting of the Glenelg Council for 1938 was held according to statute on Monday, January 10, in the Township Hall. Members-elect subscribed to the necessary declaration of office and took their seats as follows: Mr. John McGirr, Reeve; Messrs. Joseph F. Crutchley, George Whitmore, John O'Neill and Herbert Timmins, Councillors. The Reeve briefly addressed the Council and congratulated members on their election and trusted that all would co-operate for the welfare of the Township.

The minutes of the last meeting held on Dec. 11th were read and confirmed.

By-Laws were introduced and passed as follows:

No. 827, appointing Donald O'Neill caretaker of the Township Hall for 1938 at a salary of \$20.00;

No. 828, appointing Joseph D'Arcy and Patrick McMillan Auditors at a salary of \$15.00 each;

No. 829, Board of Health: John McGirr, Reeve, member ex-officio, Henry Beaton, member, and H. H. McDonald, Secretary; Sanitary Inspectors are as follows: Div. 1, John McGirr; Div. 2, Henry Beaton; Div. 3, R. J. Torry; Div. 4, Wm. Ellison; Div. 5, John McGirr; members are to be paid \$2.00 per meeting and Sanitary Inspectors 30 cents per hour for time engaged at duties; the meetings of the Board of Health are to be held the last Friday in January, May, August and November 24 in the Township Hall;

No. 830, appointing F. Meagher as Weed Inspector at 30 cents per hour;

No. 831, appointing W. A. Lindsay and Chris. Seifried as School Attendance Officers at 30 cents per hour;

No. 832, providing for expenditures on roads in 1938 as follows: Road construction, \$2000; Bridge construction, \$10000; machinery, \$1000; superintendence, \$500; maintenance and repairs, \$11000; total, \$23500;

No. 833, confirming appointment of Robt. G. Peart as Assessor at a salary of 90.00.

Crutchley - Timmins—That this Council instruct the Clerk to advertise in Owen Sound Sun-Times and Canadian Engineer for tenders to crush and haul 5000 yards or more, if satisfactory, gravel in the Township of Glenelg for 1938.—Carried.

The Road Superintendent presented Voucher No. 1 for work on roads amounting to \$84.80, which was accepted and payments ordered.

O'Neill - Whitmore—That the Treasurer accept the sum of \$24.00 from Wm. Campbell to be applied on 1936 taxes and that the Treasurer be authorized to erase this sum from his arrears on tax book.—Cd.

Whitmore - O'Neill—That Treasurer be instructed to insure Township Hall and outbuildings in a cash company through Donald McQueen.—Carried.

Whitmore - O'Neill—That members of the Relief Committee for 1938 be as follows: The Reeve, J. F. Crutchley and the Clerk.—Cd.

Crutchley - O'Neill—That Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign the petition for statutory grant on road expenditures in 1937.—Carried.

Whitmore - O'Neill—That dates of Council meetings in 1938 be as follows: Feb. 5, March 5, April 2, May 7, June 4, July 2, August 6, September 3, October 1, November 5, December 10, at 10 a.m.—Carried.
