LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

On Monday about 4000 cattle were offered for sale, including about 1000 head left over from last week. The market opened very slow and the buyers were bidding from a quarter to a half lower.

Export buyers took care of a few loads of heavy steers at from 5.50 to 5.75, with a few extra choice up to 6.00. Best butcher cattle brought from 5.00 to 5.25; fair to good from 4.50 to 5.00; common to medium 3.75 to 4.25. Good to choice baby beefs brought from 6.50 to 7.00, with those of medium to good quality from 5.00 to 6.25. Stockers and feeders were very slow of sale. Choice butcher cows sold at from 3.50 to 4.00; fair to good from 3.00 to 3.50; common to medium 2.50 to 2.75; canners and cutters 2.00 to 2.50. Choice bulls 3.75 to 4.25; good weighty bolognas from 3.50 to 3.75.

In the small meats, the lamb market held active and steady, choice ewes selling from 8.00 to 8.25. Heavy lambs discounted \$1.00 per cwt. Choice butcher sheep brought from 4.50 to 5.00. The calf market was slow at from 50 to 1.00 lower, choice calves sold at from 9.50 to 10.00, with a few very fancy calves up to 10.50; fair to good calves from 8.00 to 9.00; common to medium 6.00 to 7.50.

Following last week's sharp advance in hog prices, the market was inclined to be slow, but salesmen were successful in selling Monday's hogs on the basis of \$75 for truck deliveries. The market closed weak and the prospects look lower for the balance of the week.
