**LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT**

About 4000 cattle were on sale Monday and while the trade was fairly active, prices were not any better. Exporters purchased quite a number of good to choice weight steers for shipment overseas and choice heavy weight steers and heifers were in good demand at the local packers and local wholesalers. The cow market showed some improvement. Hog prices advanced from 15 to 25 cents.

Choice heavy steers brought from 5.50 to 6.00, with a few very choice weight steers at 6.25; fair to good from 5.00 to 5.50; common to medium 4.25 to 4.75. Choice butcher steers and heifers brought from 4.75 to 5.25; fair to good from 4.25 to 4.75; common to medium 3.50 to 4.00. Choice baby heaves sold at from 6.50 to 7.00; medium to good 5.00 to 6.26. There was a fair demand for selected breedy stockers from 4.00 to 4.25; medium to good 3.50 to 4.00. Choice butcher cows brought from 3.50 to 3.75, with a few choice light heifers cows up to 4.00; fair to good from 3.00 to 3.50; common to medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 2.00 to 2.40. Selected tested milch cows and springers brought from \$60.00 to \$75.00 each. Choice butcher bulls 4.00 to 4.25; choice heavy bulls 3.75 to 4.00; bolognas from 3.25 to 3.60.

In the small meats, lamb supplies were light and prices on choice lambs ranged from 8.00 to 8.25, with truck deliveries mostly from 7.75 to 8.00, depending upon weights and quality. Choice butcher sheep brought from 4.50 to 5.00. The calf market was slightly easier, choice veal from 9.50 to 10.00; fair to good from 8.00 to 9.00; common to medium 5.00 to 7.00.

Supplies of hogs were much lighter than anticipated and salesmen immediately secured higher prices, truck deliveries selling at 9.15. The prospects for the balance of the week look favorable at the close of Monday's market.

**These teams have met three times this year, twice in the schedule and once in the semi-finals. Markdale won by 4-3 and 1-0 and the last was 4-4.**


