Where The Reign of Winter Ends



Air-conditioned travel on a de-luxe Canadian Pacific train brings the holiday seeker to Victoria. He has passed through all the rigors of winter, subzero temperatures, blizzards and a whole continent swathed in white, but when the Rockies are behind him and he has traversed the eighty-odd miles of the San Juan de Fuca straits, he enters, at the conclusion of his trip, a new land—Canada's Evergreen Playground—Vancouver Island with Victoria at its southern tip, and he has exchanged winter at its peak for summer. Fourth largest in the chain of great Canadian Pacific hotels across the Dominion, the Empress Hotel at Victoria offers him all facilities. Fishing, yachting, riding, motoring, tennis are available for all, while the environs of Victoria have for major attractions, the Malahat Drive with its ever-changing incomparable views; the Butchart Gardens, famous on two continents; and the Dominion Astro-Physical Observatory.
