**"What Ails Canada?"**

To the Editor of The Standard:  
 The latest reports of business activity throughout the Dominion are rather of the gloomy aspect, including the breeze from the Honorable Leader of the Opposition in Parliament. But there are still a few optimists left, and some of these are saying: Eyes front to 1939, when the ten years' depression will be over, 1929-1939.  
 But this is tantamount to saying depressions are epidemic like the measles, and we have little or no control in the matter. A sounder philosophy, though, is that depressions are simply cause and effect, and quite within our control as a people and Governments. And if so, how purblind we seem to be, and how helplessly we grope for the pathway to national prosperity.  
 To this scribe, however, and to many, this path is a well-blazed trail, and there are no difficulties whatever, only to follow the path called "Common Sense", which leads to the "celestial city".  
 What is this way that is so plain and straight, and what is wrong with the present way? First, it means self-denial, but the people are not willing to walk in it, and our political leaders are content to indulge the popular surge. Rather enigmatically, perhaps, and the reader says: Please explain. The explanation is that, as a nation, we are not living within our income, and we refuse to step down to a lower level of compensation for human service. No need to labor this thesis. All understood.  
 Secondly, our foundations are corroded. The migration from country to town this past forty years has put the economic wheel out of balance, and we have to build up the foundations again.  
 What ails Canada? I have diagnosed and the interpretation is sure. It is not a secret from the gods, but within the ken of the common man.  
 To summarize: The people of Canada have been gathering where they have not strayed, and have to adjust their living standard to that permitted by the national income. And our foundations have to be built up again in a great land-settling movement. The exploitation of the primary producer by urban society must cease, and the picture of the two-
