Charter Introduced By William The Conqueror Called For Three Ordeals, By Fire, Water And By Morsel.

The origin of English Common Law is lost in the mists of antiquity, says the Fortnightly Law Journal (London). This mist has now become a fog. In short, as Lord Hellenfire once remarked, "English law started off in fog and got lost." All this, however.

is irrelevant. Very little is known about the English legal system prior to the Norman Conquest When William the Conqueror took over the country he thought that he could clear up everything by establishing a definite and logical system. William was the first foreigner to misunderstand the Eng-

"Wager of Battle"

A new and interesting form of action was introduced into his Court from Normandy by the Conqueror. This was called the "Wager of Bat-tle." The charter of William ran thus: "It is decreed that if a Frenchman appeals (charges) an Englishman of projury, murder, theft, homicide or rape, the Englishman may defend himself as he shall elect either by or-

deal or duel" The ordeal referred to in the Charter was an Anglo-Saxon-method of aring at the truth of matters. It con-listed of three alternative tests: by water, by fire, or by the "accursed morsel." The water ordeal was perhaps the most conclusive fact finder: the defendant was tied hand and and and thrown in a river—if he floated he was guilty; if not, he was innocent. The only trouble with this method was that it often prevented the defendant from enjoying the vindication of his

character.
