With the passing of Zillah Stephenson, wife of the late Albert C. Patterson, on Saturday morning, an outstanding figure in the life of the Blantyre community for almost three-quarters of a century was removed. Mrs. Patterson was born at Thornhill 83 years ago, and moved to Euphrasia with her parents when 10 years of age. Sixty-one years ago on January 1st she became the bride of Alexander C. Patterson and together the young couple established the home whose kindly hospitality was a by-word for many miles around. A Presbyterian in religion, Mrs. Patterson carried out not by precept alone but in practice, the ideals of Christian faith until physical disabilities curtailed her activities. A memorable occasion in Mrs. Patterson's life was the celebrating with her esteemed husband of their Golden Wedding day on Jan. 1st, 1927. Mr. Patterson's death occurred three years ago last August.

A family of ten children were born to this pioneer man and wife, seven surviving. The daughters: Mrs. R. J. Clarke and Mrs. Cecil Charters of Blantyre, are both in ill health, the latter unable to leave her bed, and the sons include Jesse of Blantyre; George W. Meaford; J. E. of Mobile, Ala.; A. B. and R. J. of New Orleans, La. The latter three were prevented from being present at their mother's funeral through illness, also. One son, James, died in infancy and Noble and Dr. Russell Patterson are also deceased, the latter passing suddenly only last fall.

A brother, Wm. J. Shephardson, of Walters Falls, also survives.

Dr. H. G. Murray Died in Owen Sound on Monday
