High School Inspector's Annual Report, 1937

MARKDALE HIGH SCHOOL

Published by the Markdale High School Board

- I.—Grading of Accommodations

In the basement hall the wood-work has been repainted and the walls have been kalsomined. A new table has been provided in the science room and one in the larger class room. Special lighting should be provided for the blackboard in the basement class room. Better lighting is also needed at the typewriter desks in the hall. I suggest that shelves be built to provide for school library books. There should be a suitable couch in the Principal's office. It might be needed in case of the illness of a pupil. Owing to the increased enrolment the class rooms are overcrowded in certain subjects.

II.—Values of Equipment
Library: At last inspection \$380.00; present value \$330.00.
Scientific Apparatus: At last inspection \$695.00; additions \$20.67; present value \$715.67.
Maps, Charts, Globes, etc.: At last inspection \$100.00; present value \$100.00.
Art Models: At last inspection \$20.00; present value \$20.00.
Typewriters (For instructional use only): At last inspection \$300.00; present value \$300.00.
Biological Specimens: At last inspection \$30.00; present value \$30.00.
For Physical Education: At last inspection \$100.00; present value \$100.00.
Gymnasium: At last inspection 0; present value 0.

Since the former inspection a new inventory of the equipment has been made and the values written down to the figures stated above. A new permanent catalogue of the equipment is to be made. Some additions have been made to the equipment for teaching Science. Certain items of equipment are required for teaching Upper School Science. Material is required for supplementary reading in French, and for the pupils' reference in Lower School English and Social Studies. The Principal will be able to state what is required. The Library is inadequate.

III.—Organization.
1. Ratio of pupils to teachers: 92 to 4; 23 to 1.
2. Division of duties among the teachers: Satisfactory.
3. Provision for teaching the various courses: The time allotment for the various courses and the general organization of the school are satisfactory. I have advised one adjustment in the Lower School. Fifteen pupils are enrolled in the commercial course. In the Middle School Ancient History and one course in Agriculture and in the Upper School Biology are not taught this year.

IV.—Miscellaneous.
1. Staff: The staff is legally qualified.
2. Discipline: Good.
3. Attendance: 92; 36 boys; 56 girls. All regularly admitted.
4. Text-Books: Authorized textbooks are used.
5. Registers: Properly kept.
6. Catalogue of Equipment: A new catalogue of equipment is to be entered.
7. English Literature texts in Lower School: A good selection has been made.
8. Supplementary Reading: A satisfactory plan is followed.
9. Sight Translation in Foreign Languages: Regular provision is made.
10. Additions to Class-room Decorations: None.
11. Fire-Drill: Practised monthly.
12. Work of Janitor: Satisfactory.

V.—Character of the Teaching.
The chief factors in satisfactory work are, first, the ability of the teacher or teachers; and, secondly, the organization; in the case of Science the equipment and accommodations must also be taken into account. The following are indispensable:

In English, History and Geography:—Oral Reading by the pupils in Literature, Supplementary Reading in Literature, History and Geography, suitable provision for Oral Composition, and special attention to Writing and Spelling.

In Science:—Practical work by the pupils in each sub-department (the average number in no class in Chemistry or Physics exceeding 25). Pupils' notes should be their own composition. They should be brief, clear, and well illustrated with suitable labelled diagrams.

In Foreign Languages:—Attention to pronunciation and oral work based on the authors read, with practice in sight translation. The Principal and Miss Gardhouse are experienced and capable teachers. Miss Lang, a beginner in teaching, has commenced her duties in a satisfactory manner. Her work gives good promise. Mr. Goheen's teaching is on the whole of fair quality. I made certain criticisms and suggestions in regard to his lessons which I believe he is prepared to apply in order to improve the quality of his teaching. I have reason to think there will be definite improvement in his work.

VI.—Character of the Pupils' Work.
The oral reading is of very fair quality. Regular instruction should be given in reading. The writing is of fair quality. An effort should be made to improve the pupils' writing. The results of the test given in spelling were satisfactory. Most of the pupils' work in Book-keeping is done neatly and carefully. Very fair work is being done in Art. Most of the Science note books are satisfactory.

VII.—Special Reports
