





plant food. Portions that have been dug and found to be thin in epth of ten inches with good soil and reseeded. The new grass will remain and prevent the spread of brown spots to other parts of the lawn. Transplanting Transplanting deserves the gar-

ener's careful study. Almost all plants will submit to it, though quite a few annuals resent the procedure unless sufficient earth s carried along to prevent disturbance to the roots. Even with subjects that transplant easily, saving as much of the root system ssens the shock. Never permit the roots to dry during removal but keep them shaded with a wet burlap bag. Always replant promptly. In replanting, spread the roots in a natural position and especially beware of having the ends turned up.
