Hartley Irwin Improving in Toronto General Hospital

Reports this week from Toronto General Hospital are that Hartley Irwin, who was so seriously injured in a motor accident here on July 17, is now making noticeable improvement. The case is attracting province-wide attention and in the city papers on Monday the following item appeared:

"A motor accident victim with a broken neck is making good recovery in the Toronto General hospital after emergency treatment in an 'iron lung', according to Dr. F. A. Logan, medical superintendent.

As a result of his injury the patient had difficulty in breathing when admitted to hospital. He was placed in an oxygen tent, such as is used in pneumonia cases, but failed to obtain relief. Then the mechanical respirator, of the type made familiar to the public by last year's infantile paralysis epidemic, was brought into service.

In spite of his broken neck, the patient spent three days in the apparatus, by the end of which time his normal breathing had been restored. Asked how the pulsations of the rubber diaphragm fitting close around the patient's neck were overcome, Dr. Logan explained that the dressing used to bring the neck bones back into position was such that the wearer would not even feel the rhythmic stroke of the machine. The patient is now in one of the wards.

He is one of three cases now in the Toronto General hospital with broken necks. The others were caused by diving into a pool of water and by another automobile accident."

Mrs. George Bowles Laid To Rest Monday Afternoon

The death occurred on Friday, August 5th, 1938, of Mrs. George Bowles of the West Back Line of Artemesia Township, about 4 miles south of Markdale. While she had been in failing health for several years, it was not until a few weeks ago that her condition became critical.

The late Mrs. Bowles was born 73 years ago on the farm now occupied by her eldest son. Her maiden name was Margaret Speer, being the eldest daughter of William and Elizabeth Speer who were among the pioneer families of the district. When she was 16 years of age her mother passed away and on her shoulders rested the responsibility of the household and smaller children, which she discharged faithfully until her marriage in 1894 to Mr. George Bowles. After their marriage they resided in Vandeleur district but over 20 years ago moved to the present home.

She was a woman of fine Christian character, greatly beloved by her family and friends, and her death will occasion sincere regret throughout the community.

In addition to her husband there survives four sons and one daughter: William G., Artemesia Township; Jas. Lawson, Toronto; Edgar, Markdale, and Elwood and Mary at home. Four sisters and one brother also survive, namely: Mrs. Sam McDevitt of Schomberg; Mrs. Jacob H. Holley of Markdale; Mrs. Benj. White of Artemesia; Mrs. George Black of Meringo, Sask., and Mr. Samuel Speer of Perryvale, Alta.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from her late home, service at the house and grave being conducted by Rev. S. E.
