Plenty of scientists are on record s saving this water-witching is a lot of bunk, but in three years Albert E. Patton has been poking a divining rod over Ontario farms the province hasn't drilled a dry hole.

And Mr. Patton; a tall, lean owerful and rather venerable sentleman, says he has never ridden broom in his life. "Scientists," chuckles Mr. Patton
