Our community was shocked to hear of the sudden passing of Mr. Jos. Sherwood, one of our esteemed citizens, at his home in the village on Thursday evening, August 11th, about 5 o'clock. He was in fairly good health and was going about his daily routine as usual. While carrying in an armful of wood just previous to preparing his supper he took a weak spell, falling and passing away almost instantly.

The late Mr. Sherwood was born in King township 82 years ago last May 25th and came with his parents to reside in Kimberley, later moving to Eugenia. In November 1881 he was married to Miss Sarah Hawkins who passed away 10 years ago. After their marriage they resided for some time on the 3rd Line, Euphrasia township, after which they purchased a farm at Rock Mills where they resided for several years. They next moved to Collingwood where Mr. Sherwood spent considerable time in the ship yards. From Collingwood they moved to the Hawkins' homestead on the 5th Line of Artemesia and farmed for a few years. Retiring from farm life they bought the fine brick residence of Mr. Robt. McClelland in the village where they lived until death.

This happy union was blessed with two children, Lucy (Mrs. Donald MacDonald) and Selena (Mrs. Jas. Porteous), both predeceased.

The late Mr. Sherwood was a staunch Orangeman, being a member for 65 years. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, later United. He was a kind neighbor and friend and will be missed greatly in the village.

The funeral was held on Saturday, August 13th, at 2 o'clock p.m. After a short service at the house the remains were taken to the church where a large concourse of friends and neighbours had assembled to pay their last tribute of respect to the deceased. His pastor, Rev. Stanley Elliott, officiated at the house, church and grave. His message was impressive as well as comforting. He said it is the hope of the wonderful life ahead that we seek here in our earthly life. Our evening here would be dark only for that hope. Our life here is full of disappointments, sin and suffering, etc., but in our life yonder there would be no such things. We are happy to know that the life of Mr. Sherwood was pleasant. He was surrounded by his grandchildren who loved him and he passed peacefully away leaving a beautiful memory behind. ## WATER WITCHER SAYS IT'S SIMPLE

Our community was shocked to hear of the Ontario government wants a well dug it calls the official water-witcher—he prefers to be called a diviner—and asks him to show the drillers where to dig.

Plenty of scientists are on record as saying this water-witching is a lot of bunk, but in three years Albert E. Patton has been poking a divining rod over Ontario farms the province hasn't drilled a dry hole.

And Mr. Patton, a tall, lean powerful and rather venerable gentleman, says he has never ridden a broom in his life.

"Scientists," chuckles Mr. Patton in a matter-of-fact sort of way, "simply don't understand the art of water divining. They can't figure out the why." So because they don't understand it, they don't believe in it. Here's a funny one—I don't understand it either."

But he believes in it and has a theory. He thinks he is a sort of receiving set, sensitive to some impulse given off by the little streams and rivers meandering along through gravel beds below the surface.

It is through the farm loan department that Mr. Patton works. This government department often has a farm to dispose of, and of course, a farm is no good unless it has water. A few years ago the drillers were working by the hit-and-miss method, puncturing and perforating farm-barnyards and getting water sometimes.

"It's very hard to explain an outlay of a couple of hundred dollars for a well which has no water in it—especially in a government document," smiled Eric Western, chief inspector of the department. So after we ran across this diviner we stuck to him. We think he's pretty near infallible, and we're not concerned with whether or not it's witchery. What we want is water."

(Mr. Patton does not think very much of the crocheted stick which was recently used on Lloyd George's Surrey estate to find water. He uses a straight rod, which he says is more accurate.

The crocheted stick, he maintains, can vibrate only up and down. A light, straight rod will vibrate up and down only when directly over water. Otherwise it pulls to the side where the stream is flowing.

Depth is gauged by the number of vibrations. "He told us once, just after we first engaged him, to dig in a certain spot and we'd find water at 155 feet," said Mr. Western. "We drilled 151 feet and got a good flow, and after that he was a cinch as far as we were concerned."

The government diviner uses much the same sort of rod that has been used throughout history to track down everything from murderers and precious metals to good drinking water.

"Just a light wooden rod that will vibrate easily," he explained, demonstrating with a light stick. He held it by one end near his waist, clasped firmly in thumb and forefingers. Soon the other end began to move up and down, increasing to a quick vibration.

"Try it," offered the gifted one, and the reporter duplicated his action. But the faint tremor at the free end could be ascribed to nothing more than a highly-strung nervous system.

Mr. Patton put his hands firmly over the reporter's. Slowly but surely the vibration commenced again, continuing until he let go. "About one person in a hundred, I suppose, can do it," he said.

Working for both private individuals and the government, Mr. Patton has been in almost every corner of the province. He can actually trace the course of underground streams, and says that there is a net work of underground streams and rivers running down from the different heights of land in the same way that surface streams flow. He believes they feed and drain many "blind" lakes in the province.

Occasionally he finds a geyser. At Richmond Hill one spouted 15 feet, and forced water easily through a vertical 30-foot pipe. Once he went to the aid of a man who couldn't find water in his back lot, and gave him such a copious flow the lawn had to be raised two feet because it flooded at the old level.

Mr. Patton is a former resident of Euphrasia and is well known in this locality. Mrs. Patton is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Gillespie of Berkeley.
