The Children's Excursion

Large Party of School Children From South Grey Visit Toronto and the Exhibition

"The greatest mass movement of school children on record. Tired but happy and home again. And ready for school to-morrow." On Monday morning last 239 boys and girls boarded the various trains passing through South Grey and hurried away south to see a great city and a great exhibition. To say that they had a good time is saying it mildly as possible, for the fact is they enjoyed every moment of the time from the first toot of the incoming trains until the final good-byes were said when they pulled into their home stations on Tuesday night.

As the program for the two days was fully published in our issue of two weeks ago it will not be necessary for us to give further details, but we understand that the boys and girls saw everything that was arranged for them, and we predict that the excursion will be a lasting memory to those who were fortunate enough to be with the party.

In conversation with some of the children we learn that the most interesting sights they experienced were the view from the top of the Bank of Commerce, where they could see clear across Lake Ontario, the musical program given on the chimes of the great Metropolitan Church, the splendid fire-works display seen from the Grand Stand on the Exhibition Grounds, the animals at the Zoo and the Star presses running at full speed.

The children were a little disappointed that Premier Hepburn was unable to meet the children, as he had to be out of the city that day, but his place was ably taken by Professor McArthur, the Deputy Minister, who spoke briefly to the children and complimented them upon their bright appearance, their evident excellent standing at school, and who inspired the children with the ardent desire to try to accomplish great things for the world in the years to come. The children were introduced to the speaker by Mr. Farquhar Oliver, Member for South Grey, in his usual happy vein, who also spoke briefly, claiming the children as his own special friends. By permission of the Premier the children were allowed to see what was interesting about the Parliament Buildings, the chief matters of interest being the fine floral display on the grounds in front of the building and the great picture, the Fathers of Confederation, which hangs in the main hall on the ground floor. Immediately after the children left the Parliament Buildings they were photographed by The Star, and it is presumed that the pictures will be published in the Toronto press before this appears in print.

Mr. Pentland, the Inspector for South Grey, wishes us to thank the following for their interest in the event, and for their assistance in carrying it out:

5. To Farquhar Oliver for his kindness in coming to Toronto at this busy time to introduce the excursion party to the speakers at the Parliament Buildings.

6. The Toronto Board of Education, who made all arrangements for the accommodation of the children on Monday night at the Queen Victoria School on Close Avenue, and who did everything in their power to add to the comfort and pleasure of the entire party.

7. The Boy Scouts and Girl Guides of Toronto, who took the children through the various buildings and made it a point to see that all the exhibits were seen by the children in their care.

8. The Exhibition Executive, who arranged for the transportation of the children's parcels from the Union Station to the School, and who kindly reserved more than five hundred free seats for the children in the Grand Stand, and who admitted the entire party free to the exhibition grounds both days they were in the City.

9. The Bank of Commerce, Toronto, whose General Manager permitted the children, free of charge, to go up in the elevators to the top of the Bank from which the finest view in Ontario was obtained.

10. The Board of Managers of the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, for kindly arranging to have the carillon play for the children on the Chimes of the great church, and also to the carillonist for his kindness in giving the concert, which was listened to by the children with such rapt attention.

11. The Toronto Transportation for arranging special chartered trains of cars, to take the party around the city, and for giving special rates to the children.

12. To the Toronto Star for permitting the children to see the giant presses in action.

13. The Royal York Executive, who permitted the children to see the various parts of the world's greatest hotel.

14. The Toronto Police Force for taking special charge of the two parties while in the central part of the city, and enabling them to cross the streets in safety.

The late Mrs. John Williams
On July 7, 1861, there was born in Allenwick township, Northumberland county, a daughter whom they named Eliza Anne. With her parents and brothers and sisters she came to live in Eugenia in 1883. Two years later on January 7, 1885, she was married to Mr. John Williams. They celebrated the 50th anniversary of their wedding on January 7, 1935, when Mr. and Mrs. Williams gave a party to all in the vicinity.

The late Mrs. Williams was a woman of fine christian character. For many years she was an active member of the Ladies' Aid. She had many friends and was a kind neighbour. She had not been enjoying the best of health for some time and had been confined to her bed for about three weeks prior to her death. In the end pneumonia set in and proved fatal.

The funeral service was held on Sunday, August 14th, at 3.30 p.m. Her pastor, Rev. S. Elliott preached a short sermon at the house, after which the remains were taken to the United Church which was filled to capacity with sympathizing friends. The minister spoke words of comfort taking his text from one of St. Paul's addresses, "If God be with us, who can be against us?"

The floral tributes were beautiful and bore silent testimony of the esteem in which the deceased was held. The flower bearers were Earl, Ruth, Eileen and Eleanor Russell; Murray, Lois, Fred and Jack Williams, and Jean, Alice and Annie Tudor. The pallbearers were Fred and Russell Lipton, Edwin Purvis, Jack Williams, Geo. Williams and W. Campbell, all nephews. Interment was made in Salem cemetery.

Those left to mourn the loss of a beloved mother, besides her sorrowing husband, are: Cora (Mrs. Jas. Russell), Rock Mills; Bertha (Mrs. H. A. Tudor), Eugenia; Edma (Mrs. E. Purvis), Eugenia, and Sarah (Mrs. Stafford), New Liskeard, and one brother, Jim, of Wareham, a number of grandchildren also mourn her passing.
