## SHOP IN MARKDALE

## Col. Frank Chappell Talked to Rotarians

Col. Frank Chappell of General Motors Research staff was the guest speaker at the weekly meeting of the local Rotary Club on Friday evening last. He gave an interesting talk based chiefly on the work in which he is engaged. Facts relative to the automobile industry were given by which it was shown that over 15,500 people last year were employed in the auto plants in Canada. In Canadian factories which produce parts for cars another 16,000 are employed. The pay roll for these two branches of the industry amounted to forty-two and a half million dollars in 1937. This pay roll is not all in one or two centres but is scattered over the whole country. In the case of General Motors they deal with firms producing parts in 65 different towns and cities in Canada. The facts as given above are surely evidence of the wealth-producing program of the automobile industry.

The Research Department has endeavoured to develop another important factor in connection with the business of producing automobiles by the creation of good-will in giving more value for the money invested. We often forget that this was an old copy-book maxim by which we were admonished not to confine our activities to watching the clock but rather to do more than we are asked to or paid for and such faithful service would bring its own reward.

As an illustration of the value of research work the speaker stated in 1916 a closed car with 115-inch wheel base, 6 cylinders, 45 horse power, sold at \$2350. In 1926 the same car with a wheel base of 120 inches and 75 horse power engine cost \$1950, while in 1936 it had 122-inch wheel base, 8 cylinders, 120-inch horse power, and sold at \$1510. In 1914 a house of fair proportions cost \$2300 to erect. To-day, without any improvements, the same house could not be duplicated for less than \$4600, or twice the cost of former days. Research has enabled the car manufacturer to produce a closed car for less than \$1000 which in 1919 cost \$2100. The cheaper car has the benefit of all improvements of the past few years.

The recent troubles times through which we have passed should surely awake in us a keener sense of our responsibilities to ourselves and to the communities in which we live. In short when we do well for our own community we help ourselves and every other person within our scope of activities. Be faithful in the little things as well as in the more important activities.

## LIVE STOCK MARKET REPORT

by DUNN & LEVACK, TORONTO

On Monday the cattle market opened slow and prices generally speaking were lower. The best demand was shown for choice butcher cattle, cows, stockers and feeders, while heavy steers continued draggy. One very choice load of weighty steers brought 6.50, while top sales on baby heaves ranged from 9.00 to 9.50.

The bulk of the good and choice weighty steers sold at from 5.50 to 6.00; fair to good from 5.00 to 5.50; common to medium 4.00 to 4.75. The butcher trade was from 15 to 25 cents lower with best kind selling from 5.50 to 5.75; fair to good from 4.75 to 5.50; common to medium 3.75 to 4.50. Choice baby heaves were 9.00 to 9.50 with others at lower prices according to quality.

There was a strong enquiry for good stockers and feeders with selected light kind from 4.75 to 5.00 and the feeders of heavier weights up to 5.35; medium to good stockers at from 4.00 to 4.50; common 3.50 to 3.75. Choice butcher cows sold at from 4.00 to 4.25, with a few extra choice at 4.50; fair to good from 3.25 to 3.75; common to medium 2.50 to 3.00; canners and cutters 2.25 to 2.50. Choice bulls sold at 4.00 and bolognas at from 3.00 to 3.50.

Supplies of lambs were heavy and choice ewes sold at from 7.50 for truck deliveries and 7.75 off cars. Choice butcher sheep from 3.50 to 4.50. The calf market was strong with choice from 9.50 to 10.00; fair to good from 8.50 to 9.50; common to medium 5.50 to 7.00.

Supplies of hogs were heavy and packers were bidding lower prices, sales being made mostly at 8.65 for truck deliveries. The prospects for the balance of the week look lower.
