Smith faced a charge of auto theft and a further count of housebreaking before Magistrate Browne, in morning police court.

When charged with the theft of the auto of George R. McGregor, last June, Smith pleaded not guilty. He pleaded guilty, however, to breaking and entering the apartment of Edna Grant, Wellesley St., from which several articles were stolen.

"There will be another charge preferred and I ask for a remand to Oct. 26," said Mr. Borins. "I think Detective Sullivan is to be highly commended for his work."
