Women are far more advanced in evolutionary status than men ac-cording to Professor Raymond Pearl, of Johns Hopkins University. This view, the professor told the Population Association of America it its yearly session, is based or he mathematical fact there have been more generations of women than men, since women marry off younger. Dr. Alfred Lotka, president of the association and an in-surance statistician, provided figures to back up the contention

"Since a generation from mothe to daughter measures, on the average, 28 years and from father to son 32 years, there arises a disloca tion of generation of the two sex-es. In the course of 224 years there room for eight female ancestor n direct line but only for sever direct male ancestors." he said. Professor Pearl said women were far superior to men from th biological viewpoint, having "a lower infant mortality rate, are healthier and live longer."






