Mr. Alexander Renwick, one of the best known farmers in Egremont township, died very suddenly last Friday afternoon shortly before 2 'clock while at work cutting frees along side the roadway. The body was discovered by James Ellis, who vas passing.

He was horrified to find him dead, apparently having died from a heart condition.
