Mr. and Mrs. William H. French, appointed at the November session of the Grey County Council have been installed in their new positions and are in full charge of the institution. Mr. and Mrs. Alex Smith, who have been in charge there for the past 19 years, and carried on most efficiently, have moved into the residence they purchased several months ago, where they will make their home in the future.

The new incumbents, who came from Keppel township, near Shallow Lake, moved in just a short time before Christmas and were given a hearty welcome by Mr. and Mrs. Smith, who gave them every assistance, made them familiar with the inner workings of the place, made them acquainted with the inmates and did everything possible to get them off to a good start.

The Grey County Home committee of the County Council held a meeting at the home just previous to Mr. and Mrs. French taking charge and cleaned up any matters of business that needed to be looked after before the change in management was made. They found everything to be in a most satisfactory condition, and in order that Mr. and Mrs. French might enter upon their duties without hindrance of any kind decided to pay the salary of Mr. and Mrs. Smith to the end of the month and permit them to move into their home in the village and to allow Mr. and Mrs. French to move in, which was a satisfactory arrangement for both parties.

During the year the committee in charge made some improvement to the property by the erection of modern fire escapes, as recommended by the Government inspector, and had some minor work done, and the institution is in excellent condition at the present time.

Egremont Farmer Found Dead on Road

Mr. Alexander Renwick, one of the best known farmers in Egremont township, died very suddenly last Friday afternoon shortly before 2 o'clock while at work cutting grass along side the roadway. The body was discovered by James Ellis, who was passing.

The late Mr. Renwick was in apparently good health only half an hour before his body was discovered, he having talked at that time to James Ferguson, who passed along the road about half-past one o'clock. Shortly afterwards his team of horses came down the road and were noticed by James Ellis who caught them and returned to where Mr. Renwick had been working. He was horrified to find him dead, apparently having died from a heart condition. News of his death was a great shock to the members of his family and to the township at large, where he was well known and held in the highest esteem, and was scarcely ever known to be ill.

The deceased, who lived in the Dromore vicinity, was an active worker in Amos church at that place, was highly regarded and is survived by two brothers and three sisters, Wilfred in Egremont; Percy in Manitoba; Miss Florence at home; Mrs. Samuel Patterson, Egremont, and Mrs. McNeill of Saskatchewan—Durham Chronicle.

Markdale Lost To Flesheron On Tuesday Night

Playing short-handed the local hockey squad were defeated in the second scheduled game at Flesheron on Tuesday evening, the score being six to two for the Boyne River boys. The locals had but eight men on skates and put up a real battle to keep the score from mounting against them.

The first counter was secured by Burnsides when he transferred Hartley's pass to the nets. Flesheron evened the count before the first period ended.

In the second frame the home team secured two before Winterburn got one for Markdale on a long shot.

In the final spasm Flesheron got three to make the score 6 to 2.

James Sled Gets Five Years for Priceville Robbery

James Sled, 25 year-old Flesheron man, was sentenced by Magistrate E. C. Sperman in police court at Owen Sound on Wednesday morning to five years in the Kingston Penitentiary on the charge of armed robbery, and one year on the charge of carrying a revolver on his person capable of being concealed while committing an indictable offence, the sentences to run concurrently.

Sled pleaded guilty some time ago to having held up with a loaded revolver Fred G. Karstedt, Priceville merchant, in his store on Saturday night, December 12, and was remanded for sentence. He later pleaded guilty to the second charge after first pleading not guilty and was also remanded on that charge.

In passing sentence Magistrate Sperman pointed out to Sled the seriousness of his crime, one that was punishable by life imprisonment, and expressed the hope that the sentence he was imposing on him would serve as a lesson to himself and to others that crimes of this kind must be stopped. Sled had nothing to say for himself when asked if there was any reason why the sentence of the court should not be passed upon him.

On the evening of Saturday, December 10th, Sled walked into the general store of F. G. Karstedt at Priceville, went to the till, and when disturbed by the owner, held him up at the point of a revolver, took \$5.01 out of the till and made his escape in a motor car. He was wearing a mask at the time. The alarm was soon sent out, and three-quarters of an hour later Sled was arrested by Constable William McBride, of Priceville, who, accompanied by two other men of the village, had followed his automobile and finally traced him into a farm house. He had the loaded revolver and the money on his person when arrested.

\$164.00 Judgment Against Brant Township Farmer

A case of considerable interest to farmers and motorists was tried in the Division Court at Walkerton on Tuesday of last week, in which Alex. Thompson of Port Elgin sued Herman Wedow of Brant for damages to the former's car.

Thompson was motoring past the defendant's farm, on the county line between Hanover and Elmwood, on the evening of the 7th of October, when he encountered a herd of cattle on the highway. When 150 feet distant, he applied his brakes, but the condition of the road was such, due to fresh gravel and potholes, that the motorist feared that he might be ditched himself. He released his brakes, but applied them again, and finding this too dangerous, he took a chance on dodging the cattle. He got past three but hit the fourth, injuring it so seriously that it had to be slaughtered. Thompson's car was badly damaged, and his repair bill was \$160, and he asked the court for judgment in this amount.

Mr. Wedow, who is a son of the late William Wedow, who formerly lived on the 13th concession of Carriek, said he had his cattle pastured in an adjoining farm, and that they broke out and jumped over the fence onto his farm. From there they found their way to the highway. Evidence appeared to indicate that Wedow had been notified that his cattle were in danger of getting onto the highway, but did not do anything to prevent them from doing so.

His Honor Judge Owens found that Thompson exercised due care in the operation of his car, and that Wedow was obligated to see that his fences were in proper condition. Judgment was given against Wedow for \$164.00.

Mrs. Walter J. Plewes Died Wednesday Afternoon

Mrs. Plewes, wife of Postmaster W. J. Plewes, passed away shortly after noon on Wednesday, after but a few days' illness from pneumonia. The deceased had been a resident of the village since 1919 and had made many sincere friends who regret her passing.

The deceased was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Elijah Joyner of Kingston, where she was born and raised. In 1914 she was married to Mr. Plewes. Besides her husband she is survived by one sister, Mrs. W. J. Reid, of Gananoque, who was with her during her illness.

The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon to Markdale Cemetery, with service at the house at 2 o'clock.

Frederick A. York Laid To Rest On Friday

The funeral of the late Frederick A. York, who passed away suddenly early on Wednesday morning, Dec. 28th, took place on Friday afternoon last to Markdale Cemetery. Rev. S. E. He is also survived by one brother and two sisters: Manson York at Tamworth; Mrs. Jos. Tesky of Wellington, and Mrs. N. Arbertson of Kingston.

In 1903 he came to Orange Valley where he farmed until 1916 when he moved to Markdale. Since coming to the village he has been in the tire and battery business. He was a member of L.O.L. No. 509, Orange Valley, Victoria Preceptory No. 252, R.B.P., Markdale, and Saugeen Lodge No. 327, I.O.O.F., of which he was a Past Grand. He was a good citizen and many regret his sudden passing.

The Late Samuel Wiley, Sr., Laid To Rest

After an illness of four months Samuel Wiley, sr., passed peacefully away on Dec. 24th at his home near Wodehouse in his 74th year. He was born on May 29th, 1865, and was the youngest son of the late Samuel and Mary Wiley, pioneers of this place. In his early years he was in the saw mill business, later, in 1894, he bought the farm where he has since resided. Flesheron Plows Streets and Walks

Flesheron village council recently purchased a new snowplow to be used in front of a truck for the purpose of keeping the roads in town open during winter so that the fire brigade will have easy access to any property where a fire may occur.
