His wife, formerly May Brown of Thornbury, went out to the barn to do some chores about 9 o'clock, as her husband's health had not been good for some time. While there she heard a shot from the direction of the house and rushing back found him lying in a pool of blood at the foot of the stairs. There was a shot yound in his head and a gun lay across his knees but he was still alive. Word was rushed to Thornbury and Dr. Reeve-Newsom hurrled to the home, but the unfortunate man was dead before he arrived. Dr. F. E. Eberhart, coroner of Meaford, was notified and after investigating the circumstances decided that an inquest was unnecessary.
