Most Efficient Material In Relation To Weight, is Claim of Noted European Engineer.

3-Year Production Swing Nea Its Peak Again Farm Econ-omists Depend On It.

Poultrymen balance their chance of success against two economic cycles—that of business, which no one predicts with accuracy, and the three-year poultry cycle, on which form economists but their fingers Flocks Larger This Year

The poultry cycle operates thus: First year-flocks are small, production inadequate; consequently prices are high and poultrymen are encouraged; second year—poultry-men build up their flocks to sell more high-priced eggs and broilers, but not sufficiently to cause overproduction; third year—flocks are enlarged still more; over-production sets in; prices drop; every-body trims sail, and a lot of farmers grow sour on the whole business, which in turn reduces flocks and starts the cycle all over again. This year is the third in the present cycle, a fact of importance to hatcheries as they swing into
