Ithough Children Under Five Are Frequent Victims Of Carelessness About 45 per cent. of fatal bur

occur during the first fire years of life, says Dr. John W. S. McCul-lough, of the Health League of Canada. Why is this? Chiefly because of the carelessness of parents, nurses and servants. Three out of five death-dealing burns oc-cur in women and girls. From the fourth to the thirty-fifth year, there is a relatively high death-rate in females. Between the ages of five and nine, twice as many girls as boys die from burns. After hirty-five there is a higher death n women. In old age the rate is again higher in women. Burns it women are more frequent becaus of the type of dress they wear. These fatalities in women usually occur in the home. They are com-

The danger of a burn usually depends upon the extent of surface skin involved. The simplest and most convenient household remedy for a burn of, say, the first two degrees is the application of a strong infusion of tea. This remedy has been used by the Chinese for 5,000 years. In all cases of any severity the aid of a doctor is necessar but the use of tea as an emergency measure will relieve the pain and make the victim of a burn com-



## Gardening

FIRST VEGETABLES first regetables to be plant in the Spring are spinach, all sorts of lettuce, radish and peas. Once gardeners were advised against the early sowing of peas for fear seed might rot in wet, cold soil. There is little danger of this however, and biggest crops invariably come from early planting.
